THE ICE TROTTING RACES.

TWO VERY CLOSE CONTESTS OCCURRED.

Three Heats Decided Each Race - W. H. Comstock's Kathlene Won The 2:30 Class - A Collision in the Named Race. Fully a thousand people witnessed the ice races in the harbor yesterday afternoon, though the day was most unpleasant, a raw wind blowing over the ice. The course was laid out near the Harrifield shore on the west side of Cataragui bridge, in a half mile ring. The events were the named race and the 2:30 class, both being closely contested by those within the prize money, while those outside the pale were completely distanced. Each race only three heats were required, the winners of the first heats maintaining their respective positions throughout. The contests occupied about an hour and a half.

PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON.

Passed Resolutions On Prohibition And Church Precedence.

The presbytery resumed business on Wednesday morning, with reduced attendance. Mr. Boyd reported from the committee on the examination of students. Seventeen were under the care of the presbytery. Thirteen, with the ministry in view, were approved to engage in missionary work for the first time. Forty-two have applied for mission work; and four have applied for licenses. The report was approved. Mr. Maclean completed his report on home missions. The committee recommended that Camden V. be restored to its former connection with Newburgh. Mr. Taylor was appointed to Marmora without aid. The wide field of Ernestown, etc., to receive an additional two dollars per Sabbath for a student to assist Mr. Guy for the summer. Poland, etc., to receive \$6.25 per Sabbath. Mr. Crawford continued at Parismouth with two dollars, etc., and three dollars for a student, and St. John's, Pittsburgh \$4.50. Mr. McDonald continued in the field. The presbytery appointed a special meeting to be held at Newburgh on March 20th, at one o'clock, to endeavor to effect an amicable union between Newburgh and Camden V. Communications were received from the presbytery of Glenburgh, showing that the congregation of Knox church, Cornwall, had called Mr. Harkness, minister of Tweed. The presbytery agreed to cite the congregation of Camden V. to a special meeting to be held at Newburgh on the 20th inst. Rev. Mr. Mackie moved the following resolution, viz.: The presbytery having learned with the greatest satisfaction that the mind of the Kirk sessions is nearly unanimous in favor of prohibitory legislation; and in view of the urgency of the matter, at the present time, instead of the moderator to write a pastoral on the subject setting forth the facts, and exhorting the members and adherents of the church faithfully to discharge their duty in the matter here brought before them. This was carried.

Union Man Surprised.

"It not infrequently happens that men do things with their eyes shut, as it were, without looking ahead to see what their action really meant," stated a union man last evening. "Let me give you an instance. You remember that back in 1901 alderman Graham put through council his motion to increase the wages of corporation laborers to \$1.25 a day. Since then he has been championing the cause of the workman. So from him and alderman Hippen, the labor representative, we have expected nothing but what was favorable to the workman. Yet I notice that both these men supported a motion that will have the very opposite effect, to refer to the passing of clause four, of the by-laws regulating the duties of the city engineer, and which give him power to engage street foremen, street laborers, etc., and, of course, to cut their salaries if he chooses. It was in the interest of economy that alderman Carson introduced this move. Yet it is supported by men who pose as friends of the laboring man. Fortunately, they gave the city engineer power to cut the salaries of the laborers. I was greatly surprised at the action."

AGREEMENTS FOR A YEAR

SO THAT CONTRACTORS MAY KNOW HOW TO TENDER.

The unions are fixing their lists to begin in January and run until December - Surprised at Action of Aldermen. Up to the present time the agreements entered into by the various unions of the city and the bosses in the different trades have been dated to terminate at different periods during the year. As these agreements dealt with the hours of labor and the wages, and as these in some of the trades were liable to be changed at any time during the year, it made it very difficult for the bosses to tender on a job. The prices were liable to be raised unexpectedly, and the contractor, who had made no provision for this, would lose money. As one contractor aptly put it, when addressing a union on Tuesday night: "We don't care what wages you ask; all we want is to know of it in advance." To overcome this difficulty the various unions are having their agreements changed so that all may begin on January 1st and terminate on year from that date. No changes can be made during the year. Such an agreement protects both employer and employee, and tends to establish a firm, sure basis. The contractor can tender then, knowing just what the price of labor will be during the year. He need not fear a demand for higher wages or shorter hours after he has secured a contract, a demand that has occasionally been made in the past.

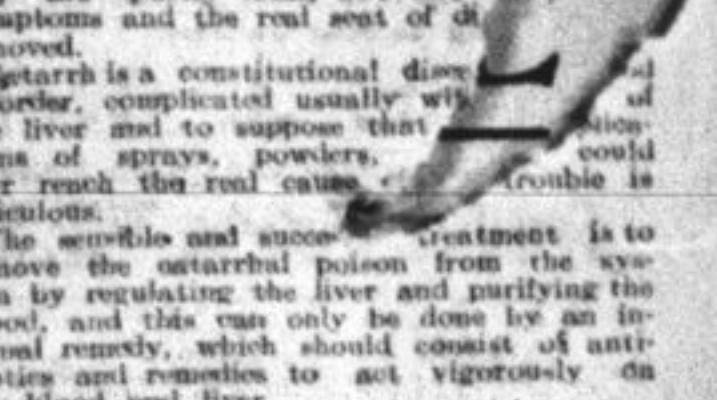
