CECIL RHODES IS ILL

His Heart is Sadly Affected 'Tis
Said

ONLY SEES OLD FRIENDS.

THE TROUBLES IN IRELAND
ARE DISCUSSED.

The Question of Lawlessness in
Ireland—Strong Editorials Up-
on the Subject—The Executive
Urged to Have the League
Proclaimed—The Trade Re-
turns.

London, March 8.—The Standard's

Cape Town correspondent says that Mr.

Rhodes is suffering from angina

pectoris, and that his condition is ex-
tremely critical. His heart is con-
siderably enlarged, and is encroaching on
the lung space. Relief is afforded by per-
iodical administration of oxygen. Dr. Jameson, of Transvaal raid
fame, is attending him.

The Cape Town correspondent of the

Daily Mail, referring to the illness of

Cecil Rhodes says that his condition is
now less satisfactory. He sees
no body but his immediate friends,
who are becoming extremely anxious.

Owing to the agitation which is be-
ing carried on by the Irish national
league the government is confronted
once more with the question of law-
lessness in Ireland. It is a rather
significant fact that the Times, the
Pall Mall Gazette and Westminster
Gazette, print strong leading articles
on the subject. It is said that Irish
executive has moved to urge the
government to proclaim the league.

Lord Walsingham has, by a deed of

gift, assigned his magnificent collection

of micro-lepidoptera to the British
museum. It contains 200,000

specimens, and is the largest in the
world. Many of the specimens are
now to be found in other collections.

The Persian government has agreed

to the construction of an overland

wire from India to Teheran, in order

to replace the Jaxk cable and to serve

as a feeder for the Indo-European line.

T. L. Pardo, the popular mem-
ber of the legislature from West Kent,
is dangerously ill with pneumonia at
his home in Cedar Springs. Mrs.

Pardo is prostrated from a similar

attack.

President Loubet will start for

Russia, on his visit to the czar, on

May 17th. He will sail from

Dunkirk on the battleship Massa-

casen on that date. M. Delcasse, the
minister of foreign affairs, will accom-
pany him.

Patrick J. Boyle, a native of Oswego,
goes to print on the Palladium, in

Father's Day, Fairmount, W. Va., on

Thursday, by letter run over by a
freight train. He was a member of

the Syracuse typographical union.

The steamer Amir, from Lyne canal,

brings news of a very rich gold find

in Old Petty, about twenty miles

below Selkirk, which is causing great

excitement at Dawson and at northern

points. Finds ranging all the way

from twenty-five cents to \$700 to the
pan are reported.

GUESS AT HENRY'S AIM.

Berlin Correspondent Has It All
Fixed Up.

New York, March 8.—A special cable
to the Herald, from Berlin, says:

I am informed from a trustworthy

source that the ultimate object of

Prince Henry's visit to Washington is
to bring about an agreement by which

Germany will be permitted to

maintain a large fleet in Caribbean

waters to serve for the protection of

German settlers and property rights

imperiled by the frequent revolutions

in South American republics. In offi-

cials' language assembled at La

Guaya is styled as the "American

station."

British Battleship Launched.

London, March 8.—Queen Alexandra

performed the christening ceremony

to-day at the launching of the bat-

talion Queen at Devonport. Kin-
gward accompanied the queen to Devon-
port, and their visit was made the

occasion for a gala demonstration in

their honor. The city of Plymouth was

crowded with visitors as seldom be-
fore in its history. Flags and bunting

were displayed everywhere, a large

sum having been appropriated for the

decorations by the town council. The

mallet and chisel used in severing the

bullock cord were contained in a

handsomely carved oak casket with

silver key, all of which were pres-
ent to the last.

The Queen is a battleship of the first

class, and is designed to be one of
