It is a costly system, but the only one feasible under present onditions in most of the workshops and factories in our cities.

That is the present-day system. But a change is gradually being made that will revolutionize things, as far as the cost is concerned. ready this change has been made locomotive works, and it saves rom four to five tons of coal a day. Which amounts to something in year. For instance, it would pay the salaries of two missionaries in China. or it would be equal to the combined cost of the liquor licenses held by about ten of the leading hotels of the

Formerly the steam, after it had done duty in the powerful engine at the shops, passed off into the air as exhaust steam, while four or tons of 'coal were being burned to supply new, or live steam to heat the buildings. Now all is changed. The exhaust steam has been made captive. and compelled to do this work. The plan was designed and carried out by Samuel Birch, of McKelvey & Birch's. this city, and it has proved successful beyond all expectations. All the exhaust steam, which previously went to waste, is now turned into six-inchasbestos-covered mains, which run from the engine into the boiler, tank erecting, carpenter and pattern-making shops, and also into the stores and offices. From these mains steam is distributed through branch mains into the various coils and radiators placed about the buildings. It travels same 400 feet each way from its starting point, and coils furthest away are just as hot as those near the power house.
