CIVIC SCANDAL IN HULL.

ALDERMEN SAID TO BE SELLING CITY SUPPLIES.

A Subscription Being Raised To Prosecute The Aldermen—The Reported Decrease in Membership Of Anglican Church Is Under Review.

Ottawa, March 11.—A civic scandal is expected in Hull. A few days ago a ratepayer wrote to the city council, complaining that the city supplies, which were paid to the letter, then the ratepayer started a public subscription to raise a fund to prosecute the aldermen.

The decrease in the number of members of the Anglican church in Ontario, as reported by the census of last year, was discussed at the meeting of the clerical guild, which took place in connection with the resignation of Rev. J. F. Gorman.

Bodies Will Be Buried At Binghamton.

Binghamton, March 11.—"Dig" one large grave; children all dead." So read a telegram received Monday by his sister in this city from Thomas Scanlon, whose five children were burned to death at Shinnoppe, Delaware county, last night.

Col. Prior Elected.

Victoria, B.C., March 11.—Lieut. Col. Prior, who, as a conservative, represented Victoria in the house of commons for a number of years, and who recently accepted the position of minister of mines, under Mr. Dunsmuir, was elected, yesterday, in the by-election in Victoria, over E. V. Rodwell, M.C., the opposition candidate, by a majority of thirty-one.

Charged With Counterfeiting.

London, March 11.—Five men, Levey, Brown, Gibbons, Freeman and Davenport, were arraigned in the Mansion House police court, on charges of having counterfeited two hundred counterfeit five-pound notes on the bank of England.

Signed a Treaty.

Madrid, March 10.—It is officially announced that marquis De Prat Natouillet, the Spanish minister to Mexico, complying with instructions from the home government, has signed an arbitration treaty with the delegates of Argentina, Bolivia, Colombia, Guatemala, Paraguay, Salvador, San Domingo, and Uruguay. Honduras, Costa Rica, and Venezuela sign the treaty shortly.

Are Seeking Possession.

Victoria, B.C., March 11.—E. J. Kepler, the Hudson Bay company manager at Fort George, reports to the provincial government that the Indians are endeavoring to take possession of the forest. The provincial government has ordered a force of officers to the fort. Fort George is situated at the mouth of the Neithaco and the Fraser rivers, and is about ninety miles from the coast.

Incident Likely Closed.

London, March 11.—A despatch the Morning Post, from Berlin, states that the German warships in Venezuelan waters are about to depart in various directions. Only cruiser and remain to meet whatever emergency may arise, although the authorities are convinced that the Venezuelan incident may be regarded as being definitely closed.

BOUNTY ON ARSENIC.

A Deputation Saw the Ontario Government.

Toronto Star. A large deputation, seeking a bounty on arsenic produced in Ontario, waited on premier Ross, the commissioner of the government, on Monday. They came mostly from North Hastings and included Messrs. Thomas Cross and J. C. Dale, Macleod, B. G. Lott, Hangerford, McLeod, Joseph James, Actonville, M. Bonnell, of Cleveland, Ohio, and Ewd. J. B. Pense, Samuel Russell, and other members of parliament.

The deputation was one result of a public meeting held at Madoc recently. At the mines at Madoc and vicinity 1,000 tons of arsenic are being produced annually now, but the deputation say that if they could get a little assistance to encourage them to start extensive plants, they could supply the whole continent. The dominion government has already been interviewed.
