METHUEN A PRISONER.

The reverse which was sustained by Lord Methnen, in South Africa, ac centuates the fact that the war in South Africa is still intensely real, for casualties go on, and with them the loss of men and treasures.

Only those who have been in South Africa, and have participated in the war, can understand the conditions which prevail. At present the country, for thousands of miles, is under the protection of British troops, Traffic is carried on with the difficulties that attend a war. The enemy has no concern for trade or commerce, and for the advancement of peace. It is composed of fragments of what was once an army, which are content, under Dewet, Botha and Delarey, with attacks upon the forces that are engaged in keeping up the lines of communication and in forwarding the supplies the people need.

A convoy, for instance, is spread out over ten or fifteen miles of road. Its progress is slow. It may be tacked, guerilla fashion, at one prace, and part of it captured, and thing may be so speedily done that there cannot be any concentration of troops for resistence or defence. some way like this Lord Methuen was a sufferer. 
