TELEPHONE COMPANY MUST

ASK MUNICIPALITIES.

When it Desires to Use the Streets -A Franchise Transferred From a Citizen to a Town

With Compensation. Toropto, March 11 .- Justice Street has delivered a judgment of the most importance in the stated case the city against the Bell telephone company. The city, in effect claimed that the company in its local business was subject to provincial legislation, and under that legislation could not use the street except by consent of the municipality. The judge upholds this contention, and said the proper construction of these acts treat the Ontario act as conferring special rights upon the defendants in regard to their works in that province, and at the came time subjecting them to the necessity of obtaining the consent of the local municipalities to the use of the streets, while leaving to their act of incorporation its full operation in other provinces. It should be declared that the defendants have no right to carry any poles or any wires along streets of the city of Toronto ARV without first obtaining the consent of the municipal council, but inasmuch as the Ontario act does not make their will embrace mills baving an annual expant power to carry their wires across streets dependent upon the previous consent of the council, they may carry

The Jenison power franchise, which around the neck of Fort William, for several years, was cut loose this morning by the private bills' committee of the legislature. The town, in company with Port Arthur, asked for the right to develop 10,000 horse power at Kakabeka Falls. Mr. Jenison opposed the grant on the ground that it would be an infringement on his rights. The town replied that Jenison had held the franchise for six years and done nothing and that consequently his rights had lapsed. The private bills committee, this morning, transferred Jenison's powers to the town of Fort William, which must compensate him for work done and mills it is proposed to construct at Fort William and Port Arthur.
