



" MECHANIC" SEES NOTHING The Germs of La Grippe Are Con-NOTEWORTHY IN IT.

He is Inclined to Ridicule The Whig's Article on Exhaust Steam Heating at The Locomotive Works-Some Facts Given in Defence of The Article.

Kingston, March 11,--(To the Edi tor): In your issue of Saturday there is a long article headed, "A New Method of Heating," that saves the locomotive works about five tons of coal a day. With all candor, I cannot see anything new or noteworthy in it. It says that formerly the steam, after it had done duty in the Tete de Pont and artillery barracks | powerful engine at the shop, passed off into the air as exhaust steam. "Now all is changed, the exhaust steam has been made captive and compelled to do this work," etc.

"The exhaust steam, which previously went to waste, is now turned into six-inch ashestos-covered mains, which run from the engine into the boiler, etc. Now, that method of utilizing the exhaust has been the usual practice for generations. To prove that this is so I have only to repeat his own words, near the end of this article. He says: "The exhaust steam heats the big tubular feed water heater in the engine room, so that when the water passes into the boiler, it is already hot and requires considerably less coal, and consequently less work, to turn it into steam, thus what was before wasted on the air is now used

to heat the building." mark here that any novice, any fireman, who has been about knows that the exhaust is to the super heater, which heats the feed water before entering the boiler. Why, sir, it is passing strange the locomotive works should careless, and indifferent about exhaust steam to allow so much of it to go to waste, to pass off into the air as reported. As the above letter constitutes an attack upon the reporter who wrote the original article and as some of the facts and surmises are very misleading, it would not do to suffer the article to pass without criticism. First of all, the reporter has to thank "Mechanic" for such liberal quotations from the original article, as he is glad to see some one help him to extend the knowledge of

Second, "Mechanic" says he "can not see anything new or noteworthy us enlighten him. In the March 1st issue of the Plumbers' Trade Journal, of New York, the recognized authority on plumbing, steam heating, etc., a letter from a Pittsburg, Pa., plumber asking the editor what method can be adopted in a case almost similar to that existing at the locomotive works here. Now if the method had been "known for generaas "Mechanic" declares, a plumber in a leading American manufacturing city would scarcely be asking for just such information; neither would such an antique method be discussed in an up-to-date trade journal. While the reporter doesn't consider the system so new that it is deserving of a patent, still he believes it is of so great importance to the large steam users that they should know of

Again, if it were "known for generations," surely the leading factories of the United States have long since the special one held only two weeks adopted it. But have they? Some years ago the system of heating the buildings by exhaust steam was would not have had that coated ton- motive works. The attempt was a mony to. More than that : the superintendent of the Dunkirk works has recently been in correspondence with the local superintendent regarding the success of the experiment here, and has expressed a desire to send a man over to study the system. "Mechanic" thinks this system is "older than Adam," whereas it is as "young as the morning dew." If it were universally known, these facts would not stand out se prominently.

"Mechanic" also questions truth of the writer's statement that hitherto the exhaust steam at locomotive works was allowed to to waste. "Query: Was it so?" askes. Yes, it was so. Up to last winter the company neither used exhaust steam for warming the feed water nor for heating the buildings. The tubular feed water heater was put in at the instance of Mr. Birmingham, the managing director of the works In his article the reporter morely mentioped the fact that the exhaust steam heaides warming the water, heated the shop and offices.
