Chamberlain Called Most Polished Villain In Europe.

Chicago, March 21 .- "Chamberlain is the most polished villain in Europe. He is very clever, but the time will come when he will be execrated by the English people." These are the sentiments of William Redmond, the Irish member of parliament, who with his wife and James Devlin, elected to parliament since he landed America, is at the Palmer House. Said Mr. Redmond: "Ireland would rise in arms now if she had any arms. She would fight England as the Boers are fighting if she could. Fifty years of treating the English considerately in parliament have not restored our parliament; now we tell the English what we think of them, of their rule in Ireland and their nefarious war in

"Would home rule cure our discontent in Ireland? It at least would remove some causes for it. With a free government would Ireland help England or her enemy, if war broke out between England and a continental country? That is rather a hypothetical question. If England were to wage a just war, which she never did in history, Ireland would fight with her.
