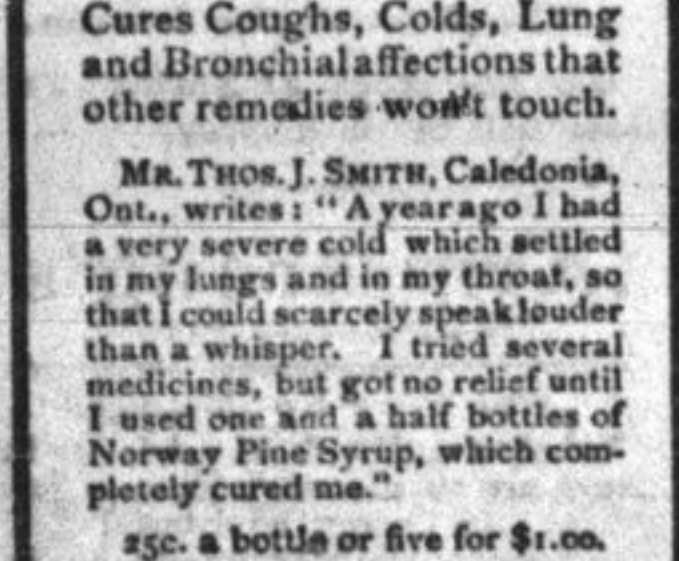

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CANADA'S MILITARY NEED.

SHOULD HAVE AN INTELLIGENCE DEPARTMENT.

Lieut.-Col. Reade, of the Royal Military College, Makes a Strong Appeal, in a Lecture to the Military Institute, at Toronto.

Lieut.-Col. R. N. R. Reade, commandant of the Royal military college, delivered a lecture before the Canadian military institute at the armories in Toronto on Saturday night. His subject was "Intelligence and Information in War."

The means of preparing this intelligence in peace was carefully outlined, and several references given of British intelligence departments, as the political horizon darkened, taking the steps to verify and obtain information on special points in or at the probable theatre of war.

Seizure Of Fish. An officer of the fisheries department, W. W. Ellis, seized a quantity of fish in Kingston on Saturday. A vast amount of illegal fishing has been done and a check was resolved on three boxes, packed for the New York market, were shipped from Shannonville, the proceeds of hauls on the Bay of Quinte. They were intercepted here, in one box were found a quantity of bass and their destruction being illegal before May 15th, the box, containing 200 lbs., was confiscated, and donated to the general and Hotel Dieu hospitals.

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DEATH OF JOSEPH BROWETT.

Passed Peacefully Away Early This Morning.

Shortly before six o'clock on Monday morning, ere the sun was risen, the spirit of Joseph Browett passed up to his God. On February 15th, Mr. Browett celebrated the eighty-fifth anniversary of his birth, and that day was also for him a thanksgiving for recovery from an illness that had brought him near to the gates of death. Four days ago, however, he again began to fail, his years hanging heavily upon him, and last night the end drew near. So calm and peaceful was his passing that the watchers hardly realized that his spirit had taken flight.

The late Mr. Browett was born in Coventry, Warwickshire, England, and resided here in the place of his birth. He came to Canada in his younger days. For years he was identified with the best interests of Ingersoll, ever since it was a town of 200. His business connections were in real estate. At one time Mr. Browett was a very wealthy man, and always of an open handed and generous disposition.

Four years ago, Mr. Browett came to Kingston to reside, and in that short period he gained widespread respect and esteem, which gladdened his heart in his declining days. He loved his church almost to a passion, and was never happier than sitting within its walls on a Sabbath day. Many remember his devout attitude in St. George's cathedral.

He widely and a number of nieces and nephews in Canada survive. The funeral will be private from his late residence, 123 Union street, at noon Tuesday. The remains will be taken to Ingersoll by G.T.R. for interment.
