



Robertson, O Bartells, W. D. McRae and others, D. E. Starr was appointed secretary, pro-

It was moved by J.McParland, se conded by alderman White that Victoria day be the day of celebration. and that it be observed on Monday May 26th, In amendment, it was moved by W. H. Godwin and H. N Robertson, that the celebration on coronation day, June 26th. M: Godwin pointed out that the latter day would be more preferable, as the weather could be more depended upon. Mr. McParland upheld Monday, May 26th. More people and more money, he held, would come to the city on that day. The troops would come on Sunmorning and remain two days.
