The competitors are growing seed grain on specially prepared plots of land, of one quarter of an acre each. selecting seed each year from these plots to sow for the succeeding year They gather well-filled heads from vigorous plants before the grain is cut and after all the conditions growth have been observed, and then thresh these heads. This manner of selecting seed has been conducted for two years on eight hundred Canadian farms throughout the dominion. The expressions of appreciation received from parents and teachers of many of the boys and girls who have been managing a seed plot have been gratifying. 
