CONSERVATIVE ENDORSEMENT.

The Toronto News (conservative) repudiates Mr. Whitney and those who are opposing the opening of New Ontario. "The rapid progress that has been made in the new territory since the Clergue company and the two or three other corporations opened there have begun operations," says our contemporary, "warrants the stand Mr. Marter has taken and proves that he has a clearer understanding of the needs of New Ontario than the other members of his own side who oppose such concessions, as those of the Kewatin company."

The government has been influenced by several motives. It has aimed at the settlement of the new territory. It has desired the use of its immense wealth. It could not ask for tenders for the spruce wood because it is very much scattered and not easily valued or handled.

Events suggests that Canada take a census of people on the de facto system five years hence. At another outlay of half or three quarters of a million of the work could be done for less, of course, by the municipalities, with some aid from the government.

Mr. Foy, the liberal candidate in Beauharnois, is an Englishman, and Mr. Bergeron, the conservative candidate, is a Frenchman. As the constituency is overwhelmingly French, Bergeron's game is to stir up racial trouble, and he and his minions are doing what they can in that direction.

THE AFFAIRS OF THE HOUR.

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF THE EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Two Caucasian brigands have been ordered to proceed to Central Asia. E. B. Oiler, M.P., was re-elected president of the Ontario rifle association.

Rev. R. J. McCalpine, has accepted a call to the Presbyterian church in Owen Sound. William Clark, of the Hamilton police force, has been appointed chief constable of Galt.

Monday, August 4th, has been selected as Toronto's civic holiday for the current year. The beautiful new rooms of the liberal clubs of Hamilton were formally opened on Monday night.

The steamer "Islander," sunk last fall by a collision with an iceberg, will be raised. Lloyd's agent has so contracted with a Seattle man.

There is good ground for believing the Ameer of Afghanistan has recently secured a loan of \$1,000,000, which may have important results in the future.

Fire in the boys' home, Toronto, last night endangered the lives of its inmates, but by the coolness of the superintendent and nurses all got out safely.

Madame Tarte, wife of the minister of public works, and her three daughters, sailed from Halifax, on the Royal mail steamer "Ionia" on Monday night for England.

A federal grand jury at Wichita said Hoffman, a prisoner in the Boer camp at Bellary, Bombay, climbed the gate and attempted to escape. He was shot by the British sentry.

The new rooms of the liberal club at Hamilton were formally opened last night. Hon. J. M. Gibson, Hon. J. R. Stratton, Messrs. Pattillo, M.P.P., and A. F. Pierre delivering addresses.

The British house of commons, with- out the motion that the suspension of John Dillon, for calling Mr. Chamberlain a liar, be for one week, from March 25th.

Toronto council has passed a by-law giving officers the right to enter any theatre, or place of entertainment and order any immoral or indecent performance to forthwith stop, and to arrest the performers without a warrant.

The colonial office is "encouraging the movement to establish cotton growing in Togoland, East Africa, as a permanent native industry on a large scale. A commission of agricultural experts will be sent to the United States to study cotton cultivation and collect data with a view to starting experimental stations in Togoland.

Mayor Jones' Factory. Frank Leslie's Monthly. The famous London Rule factory, where Mayor Jones of Toledo, has made a handsome part of his fortune, is situated near the corner of two streets. A small park adjoins and beneath a score of fine old trees are a couple of swimming-pools. There are swings, sea-saws, and Maypoles. Flower beds light the spot and gravel walks thread it.

The factory building is a modern workshop. On the wall is this legend: "Rule governing this shop: 'Don't let me go into you, do you even so into them.' Under this rule the men work contentedly. The eight-hour day is in vogue and a percentage of the annual profits of the concern is distributed among them. Their children are educated in the factory kindergarten. There is a dining-room in the building and the workmen are served with a warm lunch at the noon hour for which they pay fifteen cents.

A Jump Into Politics. Frank Leslie's Monthly. About seven years ago Mayor Jones quietly became a citizen of Toledo. At that time he was described by his neighbors as a man with odd notions about the eight-hour day, equal rights, the golden rule, and a common lawethical life. He had fashioned a new social philosophy out of home-sun theories. The fit was good, but hand that wrote cheques were held up in fear lest it should become stylish. He lived in a fashionable part of the city and rode down the avenue in a rubber-tired equipage. From the environment of a monopolist he declared himself the friend of all the people. Politicians caught the flash of a lightning bolt.

When the Toledo republican convention met in 1897 there was danger of a dead-lock between two factions. In a spirit of compromise, necessity impelled the wiles of James M. Ashby, one of the leaders, to rack his brains for an eligible dark horse. "I name Samuel M. Jones," he shouted above the din. "He is a friend of all the people." Jones' career as a publicist dates from that day.

SEED GRAIN COMPETITION.

Training: The Farmers by Practical Methods. The annual report of the minister of agriculture for the dominion is interesting reading, more especially as to the progress by young Canadians in practical grain culture. To stimulate interest in the growing and systematic selection of seed-grain, a competition among boys and girls living on Canadian farms was started in the spring of 1900. Sir William C. Macdonald, of Montreal, donated \$10,000, in cash prizes, on plans arranged by Prof. Robertson. These prizes are distributed by the dominion department of agriculture.

The competitors are growing seed grain on specially prepared plots of land, of one quarter of an acre each, selecting seed each year from these plots to sow for the succeeding year. They gather well-developed ears from vigorous plants before the grain is cut and after all the conditions of growth have been observed, and then thresh these heads. This manner of sowing seed has been conducted for two years on eight hundred Canadian farms throughout the dominion.

The expressions of appreciation received from parents and teachers of many of the boys and girls who have been managing a seed plot have been gratifying. The nature study connected with the selection of seed-grain is as helpful as it is interesting. A systematic, continued selection of seed-grain from the most vigorous and productive plants in the plots will lead to great improvement in the crops throughout the country. The educational influence of the competition is exerting wholesome effect upon boys and girls whose school years are nearly ended, and who may never again be offered an inducement sufficient to awaken and to develop a liking for a careful study of nature's methods.
