## WERE ORDERED SHOT

**British Officers Were Court Martialled**

**KILLING BOER PRISONERS**

**THE SENTENCES IMPOSED UPON THEM CARRIED OUT.**

**Rumors Sharply and Emphatically Denied by Wolsley Himself—The Armistice Has Only Reference to Orange River Colony.**  
London, March 27.—Lord Kitchener's account of the fairly successful drive in Delany's country and the capture of several of Gen. Methuen's guns is regarded as proof that the Boers will be harried and hunted until they pursue terms of peace.  
The Dutch rumour that Lord Wolsley has gone to the Cape to take an active part as peace maker are sharply and emphatically contradicted by those who talked with him on the eve of his departure.  
A week ago it was reported that Gen. Kitchener had had certain colonial officers shot for killing unarmed Boer prisoners. It is now learned that the facts are as follows: Four officers of the Bush Veldt battalions were tried by court-martial on the charge of shooting a number of Boers who had surrendered as prisoners of war. The accused were convicted, and two of them were shot and one sentenced to twenty-five years' penal servitude. The fourth officer acted as king's evidence and was sentenced to deportation. Official despatches on the subject are expected to be published shortly.  
The Chronicle says it learns that the war office suspension of operations in South Africa applies only to the Orange River Colony, and only there during the conference of the Boer leaders.  
Reports from Brussels and The Hague continue to reveal the anxiety of the Boer delegates to have it understood that peace cannot be made without their knowledge and consent. The despatches say the Dutch ministers at The Hague are unmistakably hopeful that peace will be made. They are reported to have warned Mr. Kruger and Dr. Leyds that better terms could be made before than after the coronation, but there is no method of confirming this rumor.

## HE WAS MURDERED.

**Carefully Planned; One Man Alone in It.**  
Branford, Ont., March 27.—Government inspector Murray, who has been here for some days investigating the death of James Quirk, gives it as his positive belief that Quirk was murdered. The idea of accidental death, he says, is utterly out of the question. Mr. Murray also believes that but one person committed the crime, which was carefully planned and executed. The greatest precautions being taken to entirely obliterate the traces of the perpetrator of the crime.

In regard to the crime itself, detective Murray has established a new theory. It has been generally supposed that Quirk met his death at the top of the ladder, as his head appeared above the opening which leads from the harness room to the hay mow. Murray, however, declares that Quirk never ascended the ladder, but that he met his death as he entered the harness room. According to the detective, Quirk was struck on the head five times with a small hatchet, the murderer carrying off with him the greatest precautions being taken to entirely obliterate the traces of the perpetrator of the crime.

Public sentiment in regard to the case has somewhat changed since Mrs. Haines was incarcerated last May. **"I'LL PAY MY RANSOM."**  
Chicago, March 27.—Miss Ellen M. Stone is a letter to a prominent minister of the Rock River conference of the Methodist church, written immediately after her release, says: "I am going to write a book, but I believe lectures will be more successful. My whole aim now is to pay the ransom. As long as I live I will not rest until the money advanced to the government and my friends is paid in full. This debt is even more important than saving souls. I shall lecture next year."

**Paper Mill in Far North West.**

An option has been secured on 700,000 acres of British Columbia spruce lands lying near the water, the timber being a quality and quantity to supply the conditions of her early youth bids fair to carry her through her present trial. **TO WIPE OUT DEBT.**  
Toronto, March 27.—It is announced in the Christian Guardian that a good beginning has been made in this city for the purpose of reducing the debt on the St. James' Methodist church, of Montreal, and placing it in a comfortable financial condition. C. D. Massey informed the committee in charge of the matter that the Massey estate would contribute for this purpose \$20,000, on condition that the largest amount of pulp needed to be raised before June 1st, 1903. Five other gentlemen, Hon. Senator Cox, Messrs. A. E. Ames, J. W. Flavell, T. Eaton, and E. R. Wood, have generally subscribed \$5,000 each upon the same conditions.

**COUNTERFEIT BILLS.**  
Dominion \$2 Notes Are in Circulation.  
Montreal, March 27.—A large number of counterfeit Dominion \$2 notes are reported to be in circulation in the province of Quebec. On the obverse side are a vignette of King Edward and a fishing scene. The bills are said to be fair imitations, excepting that the words "Dominion of Canada" are not so distinct as on the genuine bills. The ink is also of poorer quality than the proper notes and for experts it is easy to notice the discrepancies.

**A Murdered Canadian.**  
Montreal, March 27.—A man named John Holmes, belonging to Ferns, N.S., was killed in a shanties row last January in the woods of Minnesota. To-day his body is lying at the Grand Trunk station, awaiting the train which will take it to the place in which it will receive final burial. A poor, heart broken woman stood beside the great box, in which the remains of the murdered man had been sealed up—his mother, who had roared all the way to bring back the body of her son. No clue has ever been obtained to the murderer, and probably nothing will ever be heard of the matter.
