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

NUMBER OF PRISONERS

In Kingston Penitentiary Lowest In Some Years.

There are now only 475 prisoners in Kingston penitentiary, 200 less than two years ago. The ticket-of-leave system is partially responsible for the big decrease. But there are several other reasons to be considered. After the world's fair in Chicago, a large number of criminals began operations on Canadian soil, and quite a number of them made their bow in the criminal courts, and soon after took their abode in the penitentiary. During the past couple of years, the ar rivals at the prison have been few in pay for the lining. comparison with former years. Many judges are becoming more lenient, and are either giving short terms in the Central prison, or allowing many prisoners off on suspended sentence, believing that in many cases, young men who have been unfortunate, and perhaps unintentional ly or through stress of circumstances have committed a crime, would become good citizens if given a chance, whereas, if sent to the penitentiary their lives would perhaps be ruined Meny men, to whom judge Price, of Kingston, would have given their freedom on Suspended sentence, and with good advice and a warning, have too frequently been placed in penal servitude, and in Kingston penitentiary to-day there are dozens of such cases. as the prison officials can tell.
