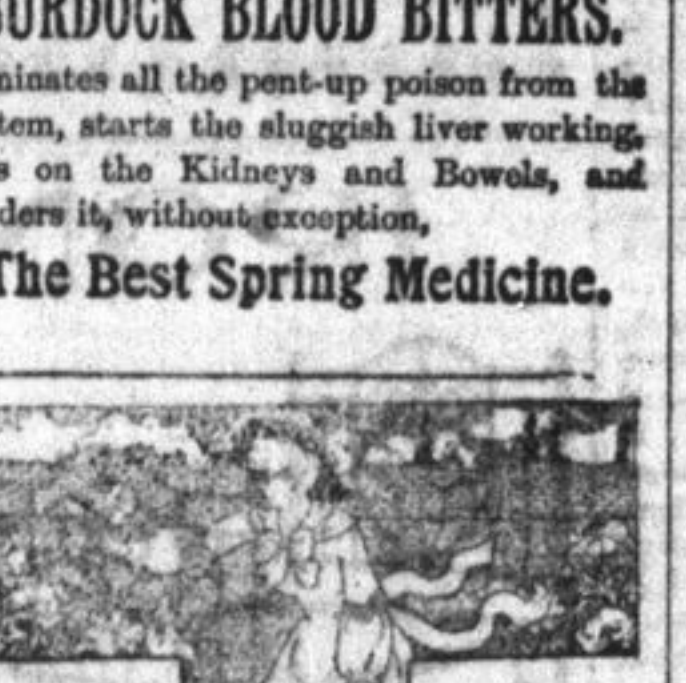

**A VANDERBILT A GAMBLER SAID TO HAVE LOST \$71,000 IN TWO NIGHTS.**

A Youngster Just Home For a College Vacation—Induced to Give Up the Expensive Sport.

New York, April 1.—A boy known as Vanderbilt is reported to have lost \$71,000 in two nights at a roulette table in a gambling house on East Forty-fourth street. He is described as the youngest son of a man who was greatly interested in the railroad business, and it is added that most of his relatives are now interested in that line. He is said to be at home on a short vacation from his university. It is reported that Vanderbilt was seen at Sherry's, and when asked if he had been concerned in the heavy play answered: "I know nothing about any game such as you refer to. Any report that connects my name with an affair of the sort is a mistake. I can give you no information."

Mr. Vanderbilt is the youngest of the sons of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt. He came to the city a month ago, and then entered into the possession of a large share of the fortune left to him by his father.

Those who tell the story say there have been many parties during the last fortnight in which the young man referred to has taken a leading part. It was after a theatre party and a late supper that a visit was paid to the East Forty-fourth street house. On that occasion the young man began plunging at a roulette wheel, and as luck ran in his favor he won rather heavily. One of those in the party said the bank paid him \$8,000 and returned the check he gave when he began his play.

When he played again a few nights later fortune still smiled upon him, and when he left the place he carried with him about \$12,000 of the proprietor's money.

On his third attempt fortune turned her fickle face in the other direction. Luck ran persistently against the player, and long before the cocks were crowing in the nearest liveryyard the \$20,000 won at the first two sessions had disappeared, and with it had gone half as much more, for which a check was given.

**WILL ALLOW NO BARNAIDS.**

CALCUTTA GREATLY AGITATED OVER THE ORDER.

The Maids Principally From England—The Idea of Barnaids is Repugnant to the Oriental Idea.

Calcutta, April 1.—Calcutta is threatened with the loss of its barnaids, and a small portion of the community violently resents it. An order has recently been issued by the government of Bengal placing a clause in the licenses of all hotel proprietors, absolutely prohibiting the employ of women in any capacity, in or about the hotel. This prohibition took effect from to-day and a number of women were thrown out of employment. The result is a widespread agitation.

The number of barnaids in Calcutta has considerably increased in recent years. In the majority of cases they were brought out from England by the hotel and bar proprietors under contract for a term of years, generally three. The loss to them of a means of livelihood is to be deplored, but as they are entitled to passage back to England, it does not entail the facilities descending Avern, that the more violent among the agitators protest. The local press claims that this system is entirely repugnant to the Oriental idea, and the spectacle of an English girl selling spirituous liquors, a trade which among the natives of India is relegated to the very lowest castes, is one which tends still further to lower the "izart," the reputation of the dominant race.

**WHERE HURONIAN WAS LOST.**

Vast Floes Of Ice Off The Grand Banks.

St. John's, Nfld., April 1.—The sealing steamer Harlaw arrived in the channel with 12,000 seals aboard. A furious blizzard has been raging for the last thirty-six hours, and among the sealing fleet enclosed in the ice floes, the steamer Algerine, having on board 3,000 seals, was forced to seek shelter at Little Sand, owing to the violence of the storm. The sealing steamer Leopold, which has just arrived here, reports terrible weather along the coast. The sealer Newfoundland has reached Placentia. She had no boarders. Vessels which have arrived here with cargoes of salt rock and ice floes off the Virgin Rocks and the Grand Banks and directly in the track of Atlantic shipping. The presence of ice in that locality is regarded as confirmation of the belief that the missing Allan liner Huronian was lost there.

**NEW UNITED STATES FLAG.**

Washington, April 1.—Representative Shafter, of Colorado, has introduced a bill prescribing the size of the field of the United States flag and the arrangement of the stars. The field shall be square and one-third the total length of the flag. The stars of the thirteen original states are to be in a circle, surrounding the stars of the thirty admitted states, in the form of a star with the stars of the two last admitted states (Wyoming and Utah) temporarily one on each side of the interior star.

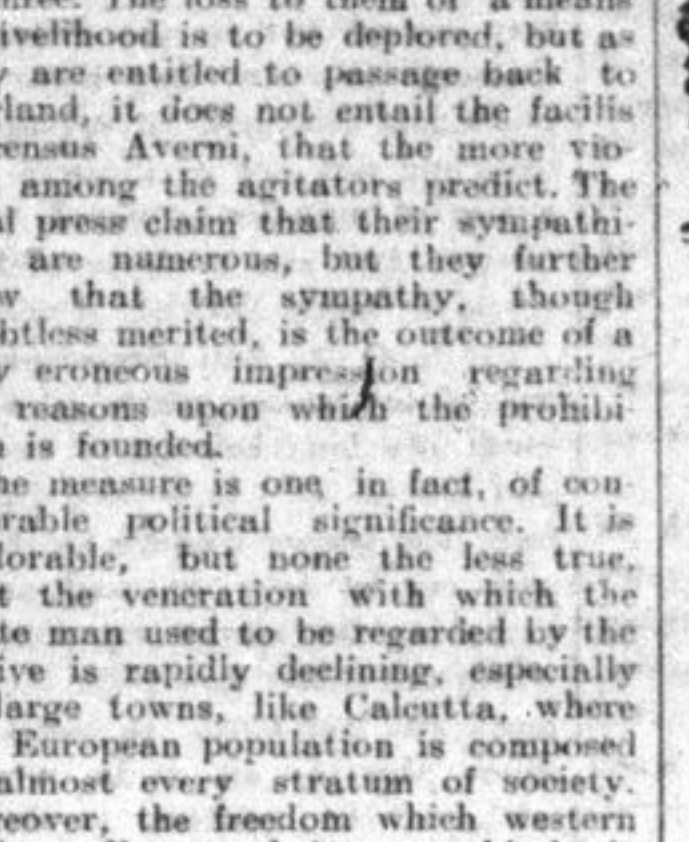
