LATEST LETTER RECEIVED

FROM DR. DUFF ABOUT THE CANADIANS.

Passed The Famous Scenes of Battle — Monuments And Graveyards Everywhere—Nice Climate When Not Too Hot.

The last letter received from Surg. Maj. Duff, with the Canadian field hospital, in South Africa, gives this interesting news of the doings of the column he accompanies:

Newcastle, Feb. 22. Natal is so hilly, and the railroad consequently so winding and circling round mountains that you have to travel about four miles to make one, and even then a great part of it is uphill.

The country everywhere is green and fertile, and during the first day's journey particularly large fields were under cultivation, and the country comparatively thickly settled.

On the last day's journey we travelled through country that the Boers had raided. Many houses are still in a wrecked condition, and many have been rebuilt.

We passed Colenso and the trenches and rifle pits, then we were at Ladysmith. When you see the place you wonder more than ever how they overcame it.

One hundred and fifty of our men went yesterday afternoon in the pouring rain to guard Botha Pass and prevent the Boers breaking through there during the present drive.

Monday 24th.—This morning the general inspected the squadrons. Our men are doing very well, and very few of them are sick. It is a little above every day. Yesterday and to-day have been comparatively cool.

Tuesday, 25th.—One hundred and fifty men mounted were ordered to be ready to march at 8.45 a.m. There was great excitement and all the new recruits were very anxious to be chosen.

Wednesday 26th.—We hear to-day that some Boers and hundreds of cattle have been captured. These are the Boers who were sent out to assist in rounding up. We are expecting Lord Kitchener to-morrow to look over the men and horses; men keeping very well. The sun is intensely hot.

A PLAN OF IMPROVEMENT

OF THE DAIRY PRODUCTS OF EASTERN ONTARIO.

Instructors Publou And Zuleit, Of The Kingston Dairy School, Have Evolved A Good Plan, Which They Explained At The Request Of The Whig.

There are few names better known to those interested in the dairying interests of eastern Ontario than those of G. G. Publou, of Perth, and L. A. Zuleit, of Chateaufort, both popular and efficient instructors at the Kingston dairy school.

For the past few years these gentlemen have been studying the problem of how the products of the factories could be improved, so that higher prices could be secured for Canadian cheese and butter.

To a Whig reporter yesterday Messrs. Publou and Zuleit explained their plan. In brief it is as follows: First—We must have some definite object or ideal in view. This should be uniformity and excellence of quality.

Second—To attain this we will have to overcome the following drawbacks: Poor milk, poor factories and inferior makers.

Third—The method to employ: By organized effort emanating from one head so that uniformity of action will be assured; also the ideal of our work should be kept constantly before us and everything that is done should be towards attaining this object, by first creating a demand for this improvement and then safeguarding these interests by a uniformity of inspection.

Having thus briefly outlined the nature of the work to be accomplished, we will next consider several methods to employ to bring it to a successful issue.

In the first place, who is financially the most interested in any improvement or otherwise of our dairy products? The answer must be, the producer of the raw material—the farmer.

To insure the carrying out of these improvements the factories will have to be organized into groups of say forty or fifty each, with competent men placed in charge, whose duty it would be to go about among these factories to see that most competent makers were employed and that the factories were kept in proper condition.

He would also instruct the makers to work along the same lines so that uniformity and excellence of product would be the result.

Realizing that perhaps we could not adopt the above scheme in its entirety at once, we would suggest that the first step taken should be of an educational character. Send out men who are thoroughly understood the situation to discuss the question with the farmers and see what can be done toward organization.

At the same time it might be advisable to get a complete census of all the factories and their condition, so that we would have a knowledge of the magnitude of the work to be done.
