These are mostly carried out in oxford, golf and heavy weight ladies' cloths and as the choice of trimming is limited to bands and stitching of the same material, the outfit depends principally upon their design and execution for beauty and smartness.

Some of the more strenuous women athletes affect fabrics lighter than those mentioned, but unless one is specially robust it is rather a risky undertaking to make the sudden change from the winter wrap to the spring walking or golf suit, whose nearest approach to an outdoor jacket is an abbreviated Blon or a jaunty Norfolk effect.
