



CALL FOR REPENTANCE. Mr. Buchanan, a lecturer for the Royal Templars of Temperance, calls attention to the fact that the Manitoba Liquor act has not been disposed of by the recent referendum. There was a larger vote against the law, in this reference, than was cast for both the candidates in the last election, a fact which suggests that there was a great deal of plugging and telegraphing and duplicating of votes. The law still stands, however, and some cabinet and legislature, Mi Buchanan thinks, will yet be found to assume responsibility for repealing it, if it ever is repealed. But the government can be relied upon to remove all embarassment arising in consequence of that law. Mr. Roblin and his government will argue that as the people have disapproved of it, and do not pouting over the referendum; and in letting things go by default. They appear to have realized their mistake, and they will have occasion to repent of it, long, in sack cloth and ashes.


