CHAMBERLAIN'S PRAISE.

MAINTAIN SPLENDID TRADITIONS OF VALOR.

Details for the Fourth Contingent Expected at the Militia Headquarters at Any Moment. Ottawa, April 7.—His excellency has received the following cablegram from the colonial secretary: "Mr. Chamberlain to Lord Minto: London, April 5.—I congratulate you on heroic conduct of Canadian rifles in action with Delany. Deeply regret heavy casualties, and desire to express heartfelt sympathy with the relatives of those who have given their lives to maintain splendid traditions of Canadian valor."

SIFTON CASE POSTPONED.

It is Said Mordens Were Spirited Away.

London, Ont., April 7.—The Sifton murder trial has again been postponed, as was hinted some days ago. Two important witnesses, James and Martin Mordens, cannot be found and it is believed that this fact has led to the postponement. The Mordens were brought here and the story told, at the trial last fall when a jury disagreed on the case, was that the prisoner, Gerald Sifton, made separate proposals to them the night before the tragedy to assist him to kill his father.

BOER BARBARITY.

London, April 7.—Writing from Verrening, Transvaal, a Scotch lady residing there narrates the following example of Boer "methods of barbarism." "Some time back we shifted from our old cottage to Verrening Station, and the people who came in our place were surprised one night by the Boers, who stripped them of their clothes and took every bit of food they had. The father just escaped by hiding in the grass. He had two daughters about fourteen and fifteen years, and the Boers stripped them also."

TO RALLY ON THE 16TH.

When Negotiations with the Company Occur.

Montreal, April 7.—The committee of C.P.R. telegraphers, which has been here negotiating for the employees of a new schedule for the company, has dispersed until the 16th inst., when a conference committee will be held with C. W. Spencer, general superintendent. The telegraphers are still conducting negotiations with the company regarding their requests.

A Strike Is On.

Halifax, N.S., April 7.—A strike among the stevedores assumed great proportions to-day when the coal handlers' union went out in sympathy. Non-union men refuse to do the work of the strikers.

The Wounded Montrealer.

Montreal, April 7.—The only Montrealer given in the casualties from South Africa is Corporal Howard, who is twenty-seven years old, and a son of Stewart Howard, assistant city surveyor of Montreal. Corporal Howard was formerly connected with the Montreal garrison artillery.

Nervous and Energetic Musician Of Ability.
