KILLED IN A SYNAGOGUE.

The Views of the Two Rabbis Caused Conflict.

St. Petersburg, April 8.-The Vilna Vestnik reports a fight with serious results in the synagogue at Kevono, Russia. One rabbi in the synagogue strongly advocated the principles of Zionism, but another as strongly declared that a return to Palestine would be contrary to the teachings of the Talmud. The men came to blows and the congregation divided, taking one side and part another. Two persons were killed in the fight which followed and fifty-eight persons, including both Rabbis, were wounded.


