FARMERS SHOULD GROW SOME GREEN FEED.

Order to be Ready for Drying -Stock Cannot Afford to be Neglected During Droughts.

The losses that occur annually to Canadian farmers from the drying up pastures in July, August and Septnber, should induce every stock man to grow a few acres of green feed. In most cases only personal experience with fodder plants will enable a farmer to ascertain which are best adapted to his own needs and district. The chief objection to soiling has been that time is too valuable to be employed for this purpose.
