

PRINCIPAL GRANT SAYS SIMPLY NONSENSE

Describe New British Tax on Foodstuffs as Such-It is a Restoration of the Registration

Interviewed last evening regarding

he new British duties placed on foodstuffs, principal Grant said a man "I think that the British chancellor of the exchequer has acted reasonab ly, whether anything comes of it or not in the direction hereafter, of the admission of colonial products without paying the duty. To discuss the probabilities of that would take me too far affeld at present, though I have written on the subject, to Briish periodicals eleven or twelve years ago. Confining myself to its present nature and effect on the people of Britain, I agree substantially with all that Sir Michael Hicks-Beach says, It corn laws. It is simply a restoration of that registration tax, which was not opposed by Cobden and the great free-traders, and which was unwisely thrown away as a sop to the workingman, a sop which he cared very little for.
