Gladstone And Irving. Mr. Gladstone was a great admirer and never missed as opportunity of seeing Irving in one of his great characters. It chanced that after being present at the first night of "Raven woo l," presented in September, 1890. I had occasion to post off to Edinburkh to chronicle the proceedings in the penultimate Midlothian campaign. At disner on the night of my arrival I had the good fortune to find myself seated next to Mr. Gladstone. It was a time of great storm and stress in the political world. Mr. Gladstone was leading the attack upon the government which resulted in their defeat at the general election two years later. When he heard that I had been at the first night "Ravenswood" all other topics were set aside. He overwhelmed me with a torrent of questions as to tow Irving ad worked out particular episodes. I remember he was particularly anxious to know how the final scene, where the hat of the drowned Ravenswood is found forlorn on the sends, was staged. He told me that of all
