PEASANTS BURN ESTATES. SERIOUS SITUATION EXISTS IN SOUTHERN RUSSIA.

Riot, Arson and Ruin—A Relative of the Czar's Sister Victim of the Mob's Fury—The Authorities Taking Action. St. Petersburg, May 2.—Duke Alexander, of Oldenburg's celebrated chamberlain of Romania, in the government of Voronezh, has been burned by revolted peasants, who practically ruined the estate. The duke is the father-in-law of the czar's sister Olga, who married his son, Luke Peter, last year.

The S.S. Anatolia, Leyland line, from Antwerp, passed Father Point, inward, at 12.50 p.m. to-day.

The U.S. battleship Illinois has left for Naples and will proceed thence to British waters for the coronation ceremonies.

The schooner Van Straubenzon was badly wrecked in a squall on lake Ontario, west of Fairhaven, on Wednesday.

W. D. Ross has been appointed superintendent of motive power of the Grand Trunk railway, to succeed H. W. Morse.

C. F. R. surveyors are locating a change in the main line from Carleton Place, to a point about sixty-five miles west.

The fund for the Monchamp family at St. Norbert, Man., is now over \$1,200. The survivors are recovering but slowly.

General Sir William Oliphert, V.C., who gained the sobriquet of "Hellfire Jack," at Lucknow, is dead. He was born in 1822.

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Dr. Keyes, archbishop Corrigan's physician, said to-day that the archbishop had passed a good night, had slept well and was steadily gaining strength.

At the Newmarket, Eng., races to-day, Sceptre, the winner of the 2,000 guinea stakes on Wednesday, won the 1,000 guinea stakes. St. Windline was second, Black Fancy third. Fourteen horses ran.

Because the time has expired for placing tenders on the Watertown, N.Y., street cars, demanded by the common council, the traction company has stopped running the cars, and will enter an action against the city.

John Clowen, an old Hudson Bay employee, who came to the Red River district in 1846, is dead at Rat Portage, Ont. In the early days he was a contractor and among other buildings he put up the St. John's cathedral, at Winnipeg.

Several of the members of the union since last meeting tried to get signatures to a petition to prevent a summer hotel being opened at the corner of Johnston and Ontario streets. They did not meet with the success they would have liked, but, however, the license was not granted by the commissioners.

The president read an interesting letter from Mrs. Thornley referring to the prohibition. She said that to-day there were over twenty candidates in the field that have declared for prohibition, promising to put it before all party issues. They may not all be elected, but if the temperance men are true to their principles some of them will be, and it may be a sufficient number to hold the balance of power in the house and to insist on some advanced legislation.

The topic of the educational half hour was "The History of the Temperance Question at the Present Time," from extracts of circular letter. This included the history of prohibition in Ontario.

WOULD MEAN DISCHARGE. If Graham Was Reduced — Machinists Still Out.

The striking machinists are still out, and there is no change in the situation. A Whig reporter called at the labor hall this afternoon, and was told there that there was nothing new to give out. Both Mr. Glouck and Mr. Holmes, here as mediators, are at present out of the city, the latter having gone to Carleton Place. They are expected back to-morrow.

Mr. Bermingham, managing director of the locomotive works, when asked this afternoon, if there was any change in the situation, said: "There are no new developments. We have not brought in any outsiders to take the places vacated by the strikers, as we hope a few days' reflection will cause the old hands of the unjust nature of their demands against laborers and handy men, and how impossible it is for us to grant them."

"I notice Mr. Homes, in an interview yesterday, lays stress on the fact that the machinists did not use the word 'discharge' in their demand as to Graham."

"Well, the words they did use meant discharge, and nothing else, for Graham could not with any self-respect, remain at work under a man who had procured his degradation, and was less competent on his work than Graham himself. If we consented to take Graham off this job he would be the butt of the shop, and his position in these works would become intolerable. This was pointed out to the machinists' committee at the time they held their demand, and they said that they knew it, but replied that they were not worrying what became of Graham, so long as they got him off the job. This shows clearly enough that, although they did not say 'discharge,' they meant it."

Death Of Shirley Going. Death came very suddenly to Shirley Going, Brock street. He retired last night in fairly good health, and was found dead in bed at eight o'clock this morning. Yesterday he complained of feeling a little unwell, but went about as usual. Heart disease was the cause of his demise. Deceased was born in Ireland, and came with his parents to Canada when quite young. For many years he followed farming on Wolfe Island, and about twelve years ago came to Kingston to reside. Since then he has been manager of the Canada hay company. Mr. Going was connected with St. James' congregation. His wife, one son and one daughter, survive.

Deep sympathy is felt for the bereaved family, who mourn the death of so bright and promising a member.

The city baseball league met last night at Congress hall, and decided "not to accept the generous donation of \$25 offered by the celebration committee," as one of the officers expressed it. The schedule of games has not yet been arranged. The first league game, however, will be played on the cricket field at 2 p.m., on May 10th, between the Odessa and the Longshoremen. May Elect Prince Henry. Lohndek, Germany, May 2.—At a general meeting of the Lohndek branch of the Freisinnige (People's party) a proposal was made and widely approved that prince Henry of Prussia should be appointed as a joint candidate at the next election of members of the reichstag, by all the various parties representing the middle classes.
