ties Taking Action. St. Petersburg, May 2.-Duke Alexander, of Oldenbourg's celebrated chaeau of Romone, in the government of Voronej, has been burned by revolted peasants, who practically ruined the estate. The duke is the father-in-law of the czar's sister Olga, who married his son, Luke Poter, last year.

The seriousness of the situation in south Russia is apparent from the fact that Dragomiroff, governor-general of South Kieff, Pocarcoff, vice-director of the department of police, and other officials, have joined Von Plehwe, the minister of the interior, at Kharkoff. The Veronej sugar refineries have especially suffered from the outbreak, during which the duke of Oldenbourg's estate was dismantled.
