

Chicago, Ill., May 3.-In railroad the result of tests now being made made on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road with a new automatic block system. It is claimed for the new system it cannot fail to prevent collisions and other accidents when engineers disregard or fail to see signals. The mechanism is so arranged that whenever an engineer passes into a section that is blocked against him an automatic device sets the air brakes and stops the train. This device is operated by a battery of springs, which are wound up by the vibratory motion of the rails as the engine and train pass over them. Accordingly there is no dependence on electricity, which is not trustworthy in bad weather.

To Have An Italian Fete. Marseilles, May 3 .- Marseilles counts among its inhabitants 110,000 Italians, and their enthusiasm has been aroused to the highest pitch in anticipation of the opening to-morrow of the Franco-Italian fete for which preparations have been completed on a grand scale. To-morrow has been appropriately chosen as the opening date for it is the anniversary of the founding of the Italian mutual aid societies on the French Mediterranean coast. The Italian minister, Luzzati, will be ptesent, and the famous tenor, Ta-magno, will sing. 
