

On May 2nd, 1899, Pare and Holden escaped from the Napanee jail, principally through Pare's mechanical ideas. He picked the lock on the empty cell next his own, and blocked it with a little piece of wood so that the lever would not work when the jail attendant tried the cell door on his rounds.
