It therefore, becomes a juestion as to how to best conserve the interests, the supremacy of the seas being necessary for the safety of British trade. It is quite time that Canada should do something for the navy. Therefore, in my opinion, Canada should assist in imperial defence by setting aside an amount of money yearly, and maintain a naval reserve worthy of this great dominion.
