

## TIDAL WAVE AT PICTON. Witnessed By Judge Merrill While

· Out in the Afternoon. Pictor Gazette. On Tuesday, 6th inst., about 5:30 p.m., standing on the walk near my

boat house I noticed the tide coming in very fast. In about five minutes the water of the harbor had risen about twenty inches. It was above the end of my water walk, and nearly level with my boat house floor, height not before reached in many years. The harbor presented a rather unusual appearance, the water reaching nearly to the tops of the wharves in some places. At about 5:35, or a very few minutes after that, the water began to recede, and soon the tide was rushing out with considerable character of a rapid running river than of a quiet bay as usual. In about twenty minutes or by six o'clock, the water had gone down fully thirty inches by actual measurement, the like of which, I will venture to say, not happened here before in thirty years. In about five minutes more the tide began to return, but the water of the harbor did not again reach normal level for a couple of hours or so.
