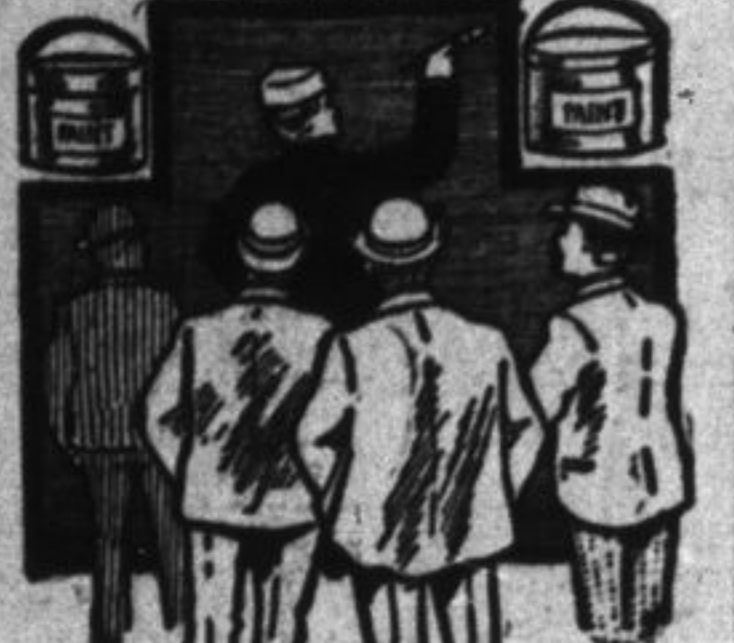

A WRIT ISSUED AGAINST SEVERAL PARTIES.

At the Meeting of Queen's University Senate.

Grant and the other members of the bereaved family, as well as their own deep sense of loss. MUCH JEWELLERY STOLEN.

From a Lady Boarder—Police Nabbed the Thief.

Fifteen months ago Walter Newman came from New York city to Deseronto, and four months ago continued his journey to Kingston. For some time past he has been stopping at a boarding house on Barrie street. Yesterday morning he feigned illness, and remained in the house. He used the opportunity to visit the room of a lady boarder, where he pilfered her pocketbook and considerable jewellery. He skipped out at noon, and lay all the afternoon in a vacant house on King street west. It was evening before the police were informed of the theft, and at 10:30 p.m. police constable Hazlett found the man on board a scow at Craig's wharf, where he had taken refuge with shame.

HEAVY REPORTS.

Louder Than Any Thing Yet Heard.

St. Thomas, D.W.I., May 20.—At six o'clock this morning heavy detonations were heard from the south east (the direction in which Martini-que lies) surpassing those of May 7th.

Affects Lake Steamers.

Rochester, N.Y., May 20.—The effects of the coal strike are being felt seriously by the steamship captains on lake Ontario, the situation becoming more critical hourly as all boarded sailors say that unless the strike is broken in a few days steam transportation on the lakes will be practically at a standstill.

Election Riots in Ireland.

Dublin, May 20.—county election contest at Galway led to a series of severe fights Sunday. Lord Morris and Killinan, a county councillor for Galway and former high sheriff of that county, personally led his supporters clearing high nationalities, which several men were wounded, some of them seriously, during the rioting.

Discredits Report.

New Orleans, May 20.—Capt. Charles Fenner, in charge of the British camp at Chalmers, discredits the reports that the British government has ordered the purchase of mules in this country discontinued. A full load of mules and horses will be sent by him to Cape Town to-day.

To Stop The Work.

Scranton, Pa., May 20.—Fifteen hundred mine workers made a serious demonstration against the Grassy Island washery of the Delaware and Hudson company, in Elephant, to-day. The company officials are determined to operate the washery, while the Olyphant strikers are determined they shall not.

Shot Wife And Himself.

Waverly, Tenn., May 20.—A. E. Justice shot and killed his wife and then himself yesterday at their home near here. Mrs. Justice was a daughter of the late A. M. Wadell, a well-known citizen of Louisville, Ky. Recently Mrs. Justice brought suit for divorce.

Coronation Entertainer.

London, May 20.—Some of the distinguished Canadian visitors to the coronation will be entertained at Hatley Cockayne, Cambridgeshire, where the manor house has just been purchased by J. C. Kelly, Ottawa, a well-known financier.

HON. DR. DRYDEN CONFIDENT.

He Says the Liberals Will be Returned to Power.

Hon. John Dryden, minister of agriculture, arrived in the city to-day, and in company with Mr. Fense left at four o'clock this afternoon for Drydenham, where a liberal meeting is to be held to-night in conversation with a Whig reporter, Mr. Dryden said that he had never entered upon an election campaign with more confidence. He hadn't the slightest doubt

but that the liberal government would be returned to power on the 29th. "It is easy to see how the wind blows," he said. "The people are well satisfied with Ontario's prosperity, and they have not the slightest intention to turn the Ross government out. We expect to win many of the seats now held by conservatives, and to be returned to power by a good majority."

AN UNFOUNDED YARN.

A writer in the conservative column of the Ottawa Journal (independent) says that "in Kingston a systematic raid has been made on the liquor men's pockets by the Ross government. Each dealer has been held up for a contribution of \$20 to the liberal campaign fund." The conservative says when they invent such fabrications as the above, President McKelvey, of the reform association said this afternoon: "There is not a word of truth in the report. Not a single liquor dealer in Kingston has been asked to contribute to the campaign fund, and no forced contributions have been received from them."

A meeting of Kingston presbytery was held to-day, Messrs. Montgomery, McConnell and Goodwill, Queen's theological students, were examined for licenses. This afternoon the resignations of Rev. D. McPhail, Picton, and Rev. W. H. Crain, Harrowsmith, were considered.

BROKEN BY A FALL.

Patrick Lyons, an aged resident of Wolfe Island, met with a painful accident on Tuesday morning. While driving down Lambert's hill, the harness broke, and the horse ran away. Mr. Lyons was thrown out, and is falling, broken his leg.

ONTARIO MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS.

The annual examinations of the Ontario medical council for this district commenced in the city hall this morning. About forty are writing, nearly all of them Queen's students. Dr. W. T. Conwell is presiding examiner. The examinations continue for the next week.

The mansion house West Indian relief fund now aggregate £25,000. The appointment is announced of Lionel E. G. Carden, to be British minister at Havana.

At Denver, Col., Gen. Funston is confined to his bed by an attack of remittent malarial fever.

At New York, justice James A. O'Grady, of the supreme court bench was elected grand sachen of Tammany hall.

At Binghamton, N.Y., Rev. R. A. Washburn died on Monday, aged eighty-eight years. He was one of the oldest Baptist preachers in the state.

The Allan line steamer Sarmatian, from Montreal, for Glasgow, arrived on Monday morning, having lost one ox out of her shipment of live stock.

M. V. McInnes, Canadian immigration agent, at Detroit, shipped forty fine specimens of German American settlers from various points in Michigan to the Canadian west.

Prof. E. L. Schaeffer, dismissed from his position as senior master at Bishop Scott academy, Portland, Ore., committed suicide on Monday.

Archbishop Corrigan bequeathed all his estate to bishop McDonnell, of Brooklyn; bishop Wigger, Newark, N. J., and bishop Gabriel, Ogdenburg, N.Y. The estate is valued at \$250,000.

In New York state there is a law requiring the American flag to be floated on or near all school buildings in the state, and until the order is complied with their share of public money will not be withheld.

Reprieved by her father for going to Utica over night, sixteen-year-old Clara Hookey, Rome, N.Y., took a dose of laudanum on Monday, and self-escaped death by prompt medical treatment.

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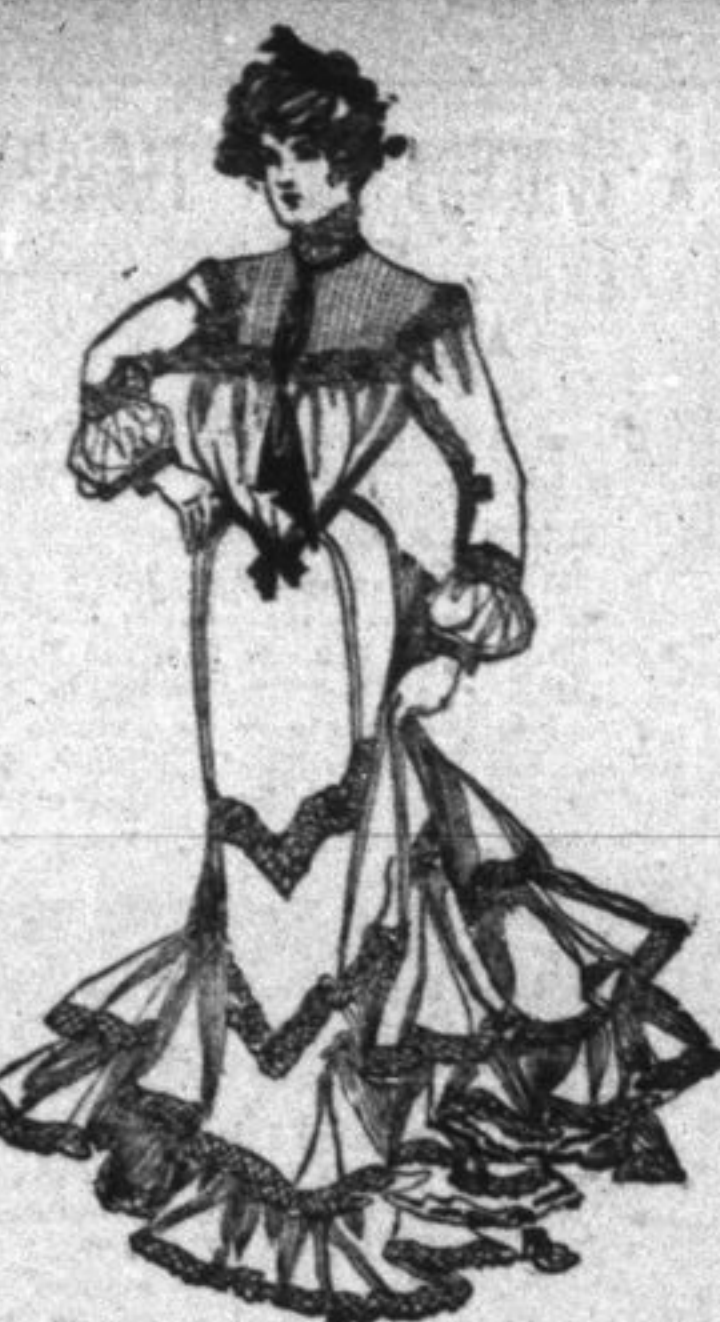

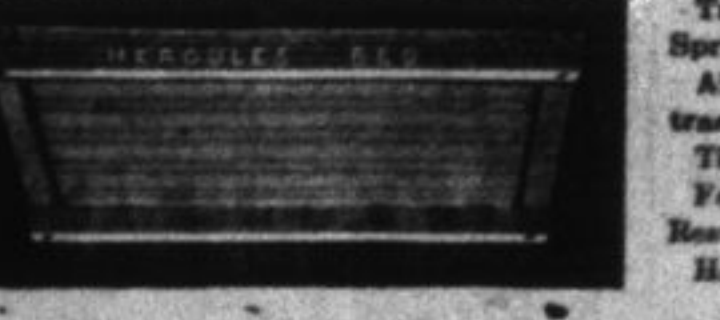
