TROOPER SCOTT WRITES About Various Interesting Battle-

field Incidents. David Scott, one of the Kingstor troopers in the 2nd C.M.R., writes an interesting letter home. Describing the battle at Hart's river, he says that Lieut, Bruce Carruthers' troop and the other Canadian troop, which was badly cut up, went at a gallop towards the Boers, leaving the other troops two miles behind. Trooper Scott was with one of the latter, which were unable to go ahead so fast, else they would have run the risk of losing their convoy. Then the Canadians got into the trap mentioned in pre-
