WAS BURNED AT THE STAKE TEXAS NEGRO CONFESSED HIS CRIME BEFORE DYING.

Captured by a Posse With Blood hounds—Took the Prisoner From the Sheriff on Arrival of Train. Dallas, Texas, May 23.—At noon yesterday a negro, Dudley Morgan, who is alleged to have criminally assaulted Mrs. McKay, wife of section foreman McKay, at Lansing, was burned at the stake at Lansing. According to a telegram from Hallville, the nearest telegraph station, he was captured in the morning and taken before Mrs. McKay for identification. His first statement just before the fire was applied was: "Tell my wife goodbye and tell her I love her. Tell her I was guilty of the crime, and it all occurred on account of Whaley Hard. He persuaded me to do it and said he would do the same. He planned it at the section house before daylight Saturday."

THE CASE IS ADJOURNED HELD THAT THE WRIT WAS IMPROPERLY ISSUED.

Sir William Van Horne Attended the Meeting of the Dominion Coal and Steel Companies in Montreal. Montreal, May 23.—The proceedings in the Gaynor and Greene extradition case, instituted by the United States government, were continued in this city to-day, without the presence of the prisoners who are in Quebec. Judge Lafontaine, the extradition commissioner, had adjourned the case from last Monday until to-day, and when the court opened Judge Lafontaine called upon to produce the prisoners. He said that official stated that he could not as he had been compelled, by a writ of habeas corpus, to deliver the prisoners to the Quebec authorities. Donald Macmaster, on behalf of the United States government, claimed that the writ was improperly issued after which Judge Lafontaine adjourned the case until Tuesday, May 27th.

He was formerly a foreman pattern maker in the locomotive works, and was a mechanic of marked ability. Mr. Little belonged to the old volunteer fire brigade of Kingston under chief Horsey, and with the present chief Elmer, gave splendid service to the city. He was fifty-six years of age, and is survived by a widow and several children. Mr. Little was connected with St. Andrew's church. His death is sincerely regretted by his wide circle of friends, who offer their deepest sympathy to those in the grief-stricken home.
