BRITISH INVESTORS.

Being Sought to Develop British Columbia.

London, May 28, Canadians are making streauous efforts to convince British investors that they are unduly interested in South African mining proper ies, and are neglecting 'ne opportunities for the development of British Columbia, F. C. Wade, K.C. who was crown presecutor for the Yukon, and who is the originator of a new series of schemes for opening a vast district of the northern territory, has been consulting with capitalists and engineers, and seeking to divert the interest of speculators from South Africa to the Yukon. He de livered an illustrated lecture yesterday, under the auspices of the colonial institute, on the resources and mineral wealth of the Yukon valley. He avoided discussing the Alaska fron-Pacific coast, with faith stimulated that Americans were displaying energy in that quarter and that British in vestors ought to bestir themselves.
