It is to be hoped the Victoria day committee does not hold out any encouragement to these men to plunder the cittens. There never was man who could beat the fakir at his own game. They appear to be losing money sometimes, but they are not. They are simply playing into the hands of cappers, whose occupation is the most degrading that the mind can conceive of.

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
