TERMS MAGNANIMOUS

That Pro-Boers Could Find No Fault

THERE ARE NO SAFE GUARDS

AND MAY LEAD TO FUTURE DISTURBANCES.

How the Terms are Regarded in the House of Commons—Kruger Can Likely Go Back to Pretoria—What the Boers Tried to Secure.

London, June 3.—The announcement of the terms of peace has not affected the general jubilation which has existed since the government on Sunday displayed Gen. Kitchener's message, telling of the end of the war.

London, June 3.—The commons was densely crowded yesterday afternoon, when Mr. Balfour read the official statement of the result of the negotiations.

Pope Expressed Joy. Rome, June 3.—On the receipt of the news of the conclusion of peace in South Africa, the pope expressed his joy, adding: "I hope to close my eyes on a world-wide peace."

The Chamberlain proclamation of last September, which was based upon the principle of non-interference, is now being regarded by aggressive unionists as a source of future disturbance.

SAVED BY A MIRACLE

Story Told By Holy Sisters In Martinique.

THE SAVIOUR APPEARED

IN THE MORNE ROUGE CATHEDRAL AT ST. PIERRE.

Supplicants of Devoted Nuns Answered—A Story They All Subscribe to—Were in Deadly Fear.

St. Lucia, June 3.—The sisters of the Catholic order of De La Deliverance, twenty-three of whom are among the survivors of the eruption of Mont Pelee, have arrived here from Morne Rouge, with a wonderful story of the preservation of that, the nearest community to the crater, and the only one within the zone of the disaster to escape destruction.

We were in deadly fear of our lives and for two days and nights stayed in the church of Notre Dame de la Deliverance, Morne Rouge, praying.
