BOARD OF HEALTH GETTING IN READINESS.

Well Developed Case in the Country Awakes Vigilence on the Part of the Local Board.

A special meeting of the board of health 'was summoned at five o'clock on Monday afternoon to take precautions regarding a possible outbreak of disease in the city. Danger is felt, owing to the fact that a man named Gallagher, who lives only a couple of miles outside the city limits, is victim of a well-developed case small-pox. The latter at once telephoned John Simpson, chairman of board of health in Kingston township, who had apprised Dr. Edwards, the township health officer, of the event. The board of health came into the city the next day with Dr. Edwards, and held meeting in Mr. McIntyre's office. He could not say where the man had contracted the disease, but he had been in contact with people from Brockville, where the disease existed. The patient had taken ill about ten days ago, and had not been vaccinated. Dr. Hodgett had seen Dr. Edwards, and instructed him to quarantine the case, to enforce vaccination and put two constables on duty at the house, one at night

and one in the day time. The city physician stated that man had called at his office on 22nd inst., and that there was rash on him then. A week later called again, and his body was literally covered with spots. He at once notified chairman McIntyre, and hust tled the man home.
