HATED QUITE VENOMOUS. PARLIAMENT WILL DO SOMETHING FOR KITCHENER.

May Get £100,000 And an Earl—A Speech By Kitchener That Was Enthusiastically Cheered—The Fighting Forces Represented at the Coronation.

London, June 4.—The opinion of the world regarding the terms of peace with the Boers, is now chiefly occupying attention at the capital. The tributes to the remarkable military qualities of the burghers are generally concurred in, but the chief note in England's reception of foreign comment is the strength of the anti-German feeling, which was uncompromisingly and angrily revived by the Times, Monday morning.



There were fifty-two horses lost in the trip of the Cestrian to Cape Town. Installation of the duke of Connaught as grand master of the Masons was a formal function arranged by deputy.

The militia department has provided \$15,000 for the transportation of troops to Montreal for the celebration and review on coronation day.

Quebec authorities are after violators of the fish and game law. For killing moose out of season fines of \$25 and costs have been imposed.

The steamship Empress of Japan which arrived at Victoria, B.C., on Tuesday, brought eighty-three members of the Hong Kong, Singapore and West Hai Wei contingent to coronation.

The first full meeting of the Ontario cabinet since the opening of the campaign took place Tuesday afternoon. The council sat for two hours, but the only announcements made were with reference to a few recommendations by Hon. Mr. Harcourt.

The late J. W. Munro, Pembroke, has been returned as member elect for North Renfrew. The opinion is that a new election will be held.

Herr Krupp has brought to perfection the best and thickest armor plate he manufactures. Emperor William has witnessed trials of this gun and has exacted a promise from Herr Krupp to reserve it exclusively for the use of the German navy.

The proclamation of peace has been signed on the stock exchange by an all round decline in the price of Kaffirs. The immediate future of the market is doubtful, but the hope is by no means abandoned that there will be a big rush for all kinds of South African securities.

How Vote Stood. Pretoria, Transvaal, June 4.—The ballot of the Boers at Vereeniging resulted in fifty-four votes in favor of surrender and six against it.

The Boer delegates, who during the peace negotiations were stiff, formal and unfriendly, are now extremely cordial. All the commandants are returning to their commands in order to explain the situation.

Gen. Parsons, commandant of the permanent forces in Canada, completed the inspection of the fortifications and troops at Victoria, B.C., on Tuesday and in an interview declared the station the finest he had ever seen for its size, the only drawback being the higher cost of living and maintenance.

Many erroneous rumors have been current respecting the number of Americans invited to the coronation function in the abbey. Apart from the special and regular ambassadors and their wives, it is not probable that more than half a dozen Americans will be among the privileged spectators.

Death of Mrs. Anna T. Hubbard at Watertown. Watertown, N.Y., June 4.—Mrs. Anna T. Hubbard, formerly Mrs. William Winch, and widely known for her peculiar experiences, died Tuesday morning. She would never tell her age, but it is believed to have been over eighty years.

Dr. Sutherland Speaks of the Work in Japan. Vancouver, B.C., June 4.—Dr. Sutherland, superintendent of the Canadian Methodist missions, arrived by the Empress of Japan, from Japan, where he has been since March. He states that the six separate Methodist bodies working in Japan are arranging to form themselves into one body under a general conference.

Lost What They Fought For. Bombay, British India, June 3.—In the Boer prison camps here a majority of the prisoners returned over the border of peace in South Africa, but many considered it had, because it meant the loss of all they fought for.

Want More Wharves. St. John, N.B., June 4.—A civic delegation, headed by the mayor, leave for Ottawa to-morrow to urge upon the government the necessity of building more wharves here for harbor improvements.

Renewed Hope For Mrs. Maybrick. London, June 4.—It is reported that baroness Roges, the mother of Mrs. Florence Maybrick, found guilty of poisoning her husband and sentenced to prison for life, has received a medical assurance that her health will be pardoned during the coronation celebration this month as a part of the general amnesty to be extended to criminals of good record.

Mistook Wife For Burglar. Beateur, Ill., June 4.—J. B. Boggs blew out his wife's brains, mistaking her for a burglar. He had been awakened by his wife and told by her that a burglar was in the kitchen. Boggs got up and in the dim light saw what he thought was the figure of a man.
