LOSES A ROYAL JEWEL.

Sensation Created by Disappear

ance Of An Historic Ruby. Stockholm, June 6 .- A sensation has been created in court circles by the discovery that one of the crown jewels is missing from the royal trea-

It is a beautiful ruby of 255 carats. and is an historic gem that formed part of the royal regalia. It was originally acquired by queen Christina in 1648, but owing to the vicissitudes of royal fortune was in pawn for years in Amsterdam.

It was redeemed in 1695, since which time it has been kept in the trensury. There is no suspicion as to how or when the jewel disappeared, but the police of all the European capitals have been warned to be on the alert.
