PAVING THE CITY STREETS

BOARD OF WORKS DISCUSSES THE PROBLEM.

A Clause In The Agreement With The Street Railway Company, having particular bearing on the question of the company's right to build asphalt walks, accompanying this was the solicitor's written statement to the effect that the city could not, under the agreement of November 19th, 1897, force the company to lay rails satisfactory to the city engineer, on Princess street, below Bagot street, as long as the track remained a single one.

The usual batch of accounts were considered and ordered to be paid. The pay list amounted to \$66,87.

It is the intention of the committee to pave Ontario street from the G. T. R. station to Brock, up Brock to Montreal, from Montreal to Princess, down Princess to King, and along King to Brock streets.

WHY THEY DID NOT STRIKE

ORGANIZATION OF AMALGAMATED MACHINISTS HERE.

To Settle a Charge Made By the International Machinists on Strike—The Amalgamated Union's Position.

Lease Cowen, international organizer of the Amalgamated society of engineers, machinists, blacksmiths and pattern makers, in the city, in connection with the locomotive works strike. He came here to set matters right between members of his organization and those of the International union who are on strike, for there are two machinists' unions in Kingston, the Amalgamated being an older and larger organization than the International.

Mr. Cowen called at the Whig office this morning to explain his mission. It seems that the International machinists on strike are making accusations against half a dozen Amalgamated union machinists, who are at work in the locomotive works, having refused to strike. They reason why they refuse to strike is that they are not members of the International union, but are members of the Amalgamated union.

The other point Mr. Cowen seeks to settle is the charge made by the International machinists that the Amalgamated union members are taking the places of the former. This the Amalgamated union emphatically deny. They say they continue to work, and mind their own affairs.

DAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE

DR. CARMAN DELIVERS AN ABLE ADDRESS.

He Hopes For a Temperance Victory on December 4th—Aid for St. James' Church, Montreal—Young Men Wanted.

Napawan, June 5.—The Day of Quinte conference opened its session this morning at ten o'clock, the president, Rev. J. C. Wilson, in the chair. Elected president, Dr. Reymar, though a professor of Victoria university, has his residence within the bounds of this conference. In a short address he thanked the conference and entered immediately upon his duties. Rev. Dr. Dyer, of Albert college, obtained a splendid ballot for the same office. Rev. Benjamin Grosby, Campbellford, was elected secretary. The president, in resigning the chair, paid an unqualified compliment to the loyalty of the conference to him and guaranteed a continuance thereof to his successor. The record of the ministerial session showed an able address by Dr. Carman before the ministers themselves, upon relation of the church life to imperial and national matters and moral reforms. His references to the present peace, to the grand possibility of carrying the referendum were frequently applauded. Rev. Vernon Emory also took the platform and delivered a most vigorous and finished temperance address. The conference was largely a unit upon action on December 4th.

It was reported that J. C. Ash, who had been located, was asking the payment of his superannuation claim. The committee on his case recommended that the matter go to the general conference for action, and if necessary for legislation. The conference was so ordered. It was found that there were not enough young men to supply the demands of the work thereof, and some credits will remain unassigned for the year. Action is to be taken to make good this lack.

Rev. J. W. Graham, B.A., pastor of St. James' church, Montreal, address of the conference on behalf of the church. The matter was referred to a committee which will deal therewith in a most generous way. A later report will give details of a plan by which it is expected the amount laid upon the conference will be practically raised.

The conference proceeded to full organization of committees, to which were handed a large number of documents from districts on which they will take action.

The conference has over 300 delegates in town. The work proper of the meeting commenced yesterday and will be continued the rest of the week and until Tuesday next.
