Classification of Canada'

Census bulletin No. S made its appoarance recently. The foreign-born population is classified by age, time of immigration, and the countries whence they emigrated, and the foreign and native born by birthplace. The foreign-born are grouped according to age in three periods, namely, under 10 years, 10 years and under 20 years, 20 years and upwards; and according to time of arrival in the country in periods of five years, commencing with 1871. The native-born are grouped to show for the various territorial divisions the number of persons born in town and county of each province and territory. They constitute 87 per cent, of the whole population, and the urban is to the rural born in the ratio of 3 to 1. Exclusive of the British Islands and possessions, the foreign-born as grouped by both places, number as

All immigrants of British birth are counted as Canadian citizens, and all of foreign birth are counted as aliens unless they have become citizens by naturalization.

The table of birthplace and citizenship is prepared from data supplied by bulletin No. 7, and this bulletin shows the progress of naturalization amongst the immigrant classes. Of the total of 278,804 there are 134, 942 aliens, according to bulletin No. 7, but the whole number includes a very large proportion of the 159,200 immigrants who arrived in the 5 years, 1896 to March 31, 1901. The country from which the largest number has come is the United States, and of the total of 127,891 born there it appears that 64,498 have been naturalized

In the older provinces of Ontario and Quebec there are 72,580 who were born in the United States, and 59,728 of these are naturalized citizens. The immigration from the United Kingdom does not suffice to supply the loss by death among the British-born in the country, especially among immigrants of Irish and Scottish birth, as the following table

Although the production for 1901 is about three times as large as that for the year previous, the building of hew plants now in progress ensures a much larger increase this and next year. The production in Canada is only 22 per cent. of the capacity, whereas in the United States it is 60 per cent. of the capacity. Per capita the production in the States is four times as great as in Canada; in the former country it is 475 lbs., in the latter it is 110 Ibs. We do not yet produce nearly enough for our own wants, which are estimated at 800,000 tons year. Not that our importations of pig iron are heavy; last year they were only 35,782 tons.
