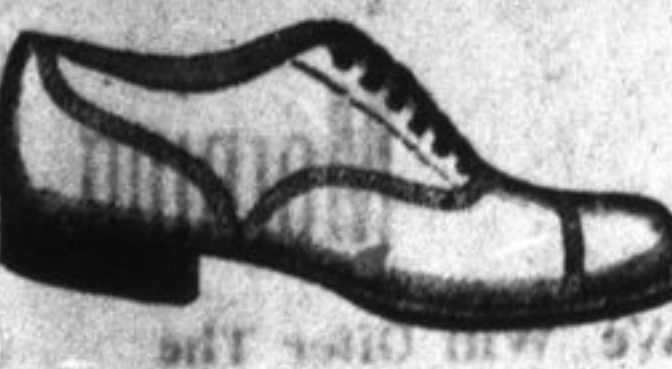

GOOD WILL IN SURRENDER

BRITISH AND BOERS ARE IN AMICABLE RELATIONS.

Dewet Addresses Thousands of Boer Men, Women and Children at Winburg, Asking Them to be Loyal to the New Government.

London, June 16.—Despatches received here from South Africa show that the surrenders of Boers are proceeding with the greatest good will.

The appearance of Gen. Dewet at the camp at Winburg was the signal for a great display of enthusiasm. When he arrived at the camp Gen. Dewet was at once surrounded by thousands of Boer men, women and children, who struggled and clamored to shake the hand of their hero.

Gen. Dewet, mounted a table and delivered an address. He warmly applauded the staunch support that the women had given the burghers during the war, which he said, had greatly endeared the men in the field.

Gen. Dewet recommended his hearers to be loyal to the new government, and said: "Perhaps it is hard for you to hear this from my mouth, but God has decided the issue."

Neither Gen. Dewet nor Mr. Steyn, former president of the old Orange Free State, was wounded during the war. Gen. Dewet has not seen his wife for two years.

The repatriation committee, which has been formed to assist the Boers in returning to their farms, has a rigid demand that we be faithful to our new government. Let us submit to His decision.

Delarey Surrenders. Pretoria, June 16.—Gen. Delarey has surrendered at Leichtenburg, Transvaal, with 800 men.

TRIP TO WATERTOWN, N.Y.

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COL. GRIMM'S SENTENCE

FOR DIVULGING RUSSIAN MILITARY SECRETS.

He is Deprived of His Rights and to Spend Twelve Years at Hard Labor—The Discovery of Treason Made Through Revengeful Wife.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, June 16.—The trial of Col. Grimm, of the Russian army, who was sentenced to be deprived of all rights and to imprisonment at hard labor for twelve years, for having revealed Russian military secrets to a foreign power, it was said that several aristocratic Polish ladies had been arrested as accomplices of the colonel, and that a large number of other persons were taken into custody in connection with the case.

It has been said that Col. Grimm, during the ten years revealed to a foreign power every military plan prepared by Russia in the eventuality of war, and the discovery of Col. Grimm's treason was due to his wife, who denounced her husband in revenge for his having paid court to another woman. The power to which Col. Grimm is said to have divulged his information has been variously designated as Germany, Austria and France.

In Russia the betrayal of military secrets is not a capital offence, unless this betrayal is made to a power with which Russia is at war.
