CHARLES CLARK NOMINATED FOR POSITION OF ENGINEER OF PUMPING STATION.

Meeting of Water Works Committee—Wants a Ten Inch Main—Board of Works Cleans Off a Long Slate of Business.

At yesterday's regular meeting of the city committee on water works, those members answered the roll call: A. L. King, chairman; Sears, Graham, Mallen, Iait, Abbott.

It was decided to comply as far as possible with the request of the ratepayers, to equalize the boulevards and to have the telephone poles moved back. Ald. Dunlop moved the resolution.

Ald. McLeod and the city engineer were appointed a committee to see what Mrs. Nash's gore could be purchased for, so as to straighten the southern portion of Albert street.

When Chairman McLeod, of the board of works, took his seat at yesterday's session of that civic committee, these members were in their seats about the oblong table: Aids. Craig, Walker, McFarland, and the city engineer were also present.

A number of accounts and the pay list, amounting to \$65.60, and a number of accounts, were presented and passed.

The next question taken up was the appointment of an assistant engineer for the water works pumping station. According to pre-arrangement, Ald. Tait moved that the committee recommend to council that Charles Clarke receive the appointment.

The petition of residents of the lower portion of Albert street, protesting against the narrowing of the street to twenty-six feet, and asking that the north end, abutting Union street, be straightened so as to bring it in line with the street continuation on the north side of Union street, was next considered.

Prof. Macmillan and Thomas Mills were present in support of the petition. They did not want the road with a grade of less width than thirty-four feet.
