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THE AFFAIRS OF THE HOUR.

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF THE EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody. Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

It is proposed to connect Warsaw with the Baltic by a ship canal. The tourist travel between Montreal and Quebec is very large at present.

Ninety per cent. of the 125,000,000 people of the Russian empire are farmers. Sunday work on the treadmill is to be abolished in thirteen British prisons.

The hoisting of the black flag after executions is to be abolished in England. The estimated loss in the strike of the anthracite coal strike is \$35,000,000.

The king has completely recovered his health, and has arranged for the court to return to London to-day. The Maple Leaf saw works at Galt, owned by Shurley & Dietrich, were burned on Saturday. The loss is \$75,000.

Worn out by overwork, Albert Snyder, of Oswego, N.Y., has had four days and nights of what the doctors say is natural sleep.

An explosion on a Chinese warship lying in the Yangtze river sank the vessel in thirty seconds. Only two men escaped out of 150.

Donald Eddy fell beneath a moving train at Winnipeg on Tuesday and his arm and leg were badly crushed. He cannot survive the accident.

P.W. Leete, a prominent surveyor and a direct descendant of a colonial governor Leete, of Connecticut, died at Sylvan Beach, aged eighty-seven years, recently.

George H. Robertson, of Gouverneur, N.Y., has mysteriously disappeared. Foul play is suspected. His wife and a farm labourer are under police supervision.

A Philadelphia newsboy named Jerry Donnelly, of Lockport, N.Y., received word on Thursday that he had fallen heir to \$5,000 left by a relative in Toronto.

Lord Milner took the oath as governor of the Transvaal in the presence of a large assembly at Pretoria. He was heartily cheered and a salute was fired from the fort.

Corva is going to have her army organized under the supervision of British officers. King Edward has given permission to his officers to look after the Korean army.

The British bark Fannie Kerr was burned at sea on June 14th. The vessel was carrying a cargo of coal worth \$80,000. She had 3,750 tons of coal on board at the time.

The United States post office department has refused transmission of the issue of the matter having the imprint of the union label of the Alford printing trades on the cover.

FORTY YEARS ABSENT.

Mason Phelan Returns From Texas On a Visit.

Over forty years ago Mason Phelan left Kingston for the United States, and until last week he had never returned to visit his native land.

Mr. Phelan was born in Pictou sixty-one years ago. When a boy of fifteen or sixteen years he drove the stage between that town and Kingston. This was before the Grand Trunk.

He was in the first railway in Canada, was built, and traffic and travel by stage in those early days were large and important.

Many were the hardships he experienced during the severe winter storms that blocked roads and made travel almost impossible.

Mr. Phelan still remembers the old stone building on lower Brock street, now called the Clarendon house. It was then a well-kept restaurant, and every day, as he reached the city, the young stage driver would be met by the old man.

Mr. Phelan decided to go to the United States to make his fortune. Mr. Merrill (now judge Merrill), of Pictou, accompanied him. Mr. Phelan says that he can well remember the cold winter's day on which they drove across the ice from Kingston to Cape Vincent.

They had letters of introduction to Horace Greeley, who was then prominent in many phases of American life, to A. T. Stewart, the millionaire dry goods merchant, and other prominent Americans in the New England cities.

Mr. Phelan continued his travels throughout all the western states. Finally he located in Texas, where he opened a large foundry, which he has since successfully managed.

And now after forty years of absence he has returned to visit the friends and scenes of his earlier days. But a vast change has taken place since then, and it is doubtful if he would know any of the cities, towns or villages he knew when a boy.

He did not recognize Kingston, so great had been the change, but he was more than delighted with the progress the old city had made.

When he left Canada, Deseronto consisted only of a little wharf, an hotel and one or two small frame buildings. It was called Indian Mills in those days.

Mr. Phelan has gone to York to visit a relative of his, Mrs. Connolly, whose husband once conducted the mills there. He has friends in Napanee, Pictou and other points, whom he will also visit.
