USED BLASTING POWDER

CONVICT ATTEMPTS TO BLOW UP PRISON.

Throws Them Into Corridor And Only One Explodes—Hole Is Torn In The Flooring, Causing a General Panic—Authorities Are Silent.

Montreal, July 8.—An attempt was made to wreck a portion of the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, with bombs, but the scheme failed. There was but slight damage to the building itself, though the lives of many of the inmates were placed in jeopardy.

The use of blasting powder leads to the assumption that it was obtained by stealth from the quarries, worked by the penitentiary. Whether the object of the party or parties who threw the bombs was escape or a desire for revenge is not known.

Reports received here from different parts of the province of Quebec are to the effect that this summer's hay crop is phenomenal and will exceed anything in the history of the province.

The Saints are not discouraged by the failure of the world to end last evening, but say that the gathering had been to them a most profitable season, demonstrating more fully their belief that the end of the world is at hand.

A Strike Is On. Calgary, N.W.T., July 8.—Calgary carpenters inaugurated a strike yesterday, because the contractors refused to abrogate in the matter of wages.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest News Collected From All Over The World.

At Oswego, N.Y., Mrs. Roxanna Tuller, wife of Gardner S. Tuller, Mexico, N.Y., dropped dead of apoplexy in the railway station.

At Oswego, N.Y., the Cumberland flour mill was struck by lightning and burned on Monday night. The loss will probably exceed \$150,000.

At Fulton, the main building of the Oswego county agricultural society was struck by lightning and destroyed during one of the most terrific electric storms that ever visited the section.

At Theresa, N.Y., on Monday lightning struck the steeple of the Methodist church, splintering and shattering it in several places and throwing huge pieces of the tower roof clear across the church yard.

At Hornellsville, N.Y., Marshall Jones, aged twenty-one years, private secretary to Governor Goldsborough, of the Allegany division of the Erie railroad, accidentally shot and killed himself while cleaning a revolver.

Edward Yatenman and Charles Love, tried to break jail at Watertown, N.Y., on Monday. They cut an iron bar with a table knife. Prisoners told the turkey and a search revealed the facts. Both men are now closely confined.

LABOR LACK IN TRANSVAAL.

NOT SUFFICIENT NUMBER OF MINE WORKERS.

Importation Of Asiatics—This Will Not Be Resorted To If Possible To Obtain Whites By Immigration.

London, July 8.—"It seems probable," says the Times correspondent at Johannesburg, "there will be permanent difficulty in making the supply of native labor keep pace with the growing requirements of the mine."

The scarcity of native labor is politically most undesirable, and South African opinion will only tolerate it as a last resort, where all other expedients have failed.

The process has not yet reached its limits, and new mechanical appliances, better organization, and increased efficiency may lead to a great reduction in the estimate of the number of natives which will ultimately be required.
