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MARINE INTELLIGENCE. Notes Regarding the Movements of Vessels.

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The steamer Niagara, which got in trouble at Charlotte, did not come here yesterday, but returned west, after transferring her passengers to the steamer Toronto. Swift's wharf: Steamers Toronto, down and up; Captain from Charlotte; Corsican from Montreal to night; Rideau Queen cleared for Ottawa.

Travel on the Rideau steamers is not nearly up to last year's mark, at this time. Capt. Noonan, states, however, that the line is more than paying expenses, which others are not. The steamer Niagara, returning from Belleville to Picton, went aground near Northport. The steamer Aberdeen, attempting to release her, also went aground. Should Grade The Licensees. "If laundries are to be taxed," said a prominent citizen last evening, "the tax should be a graded one, from \$3 up. This is what Toronto proposes to do, and it is the only fair proceeding. The Chinaman, who makes an honest living by doing what little work he can do himself, should not be taxed a quarter of that imposed on larger Chinese or white laundries. If we impose too large a license fee, we shut out the small laundries, and are helping the larger and stronger ones to form a combine. The tax would be directly against our own interests, and the farthest removed from the object aimed at. Let the city council be fair and impartial; let them grade the license, and give to all citizens, irrespective of race or creed, their civil rights as freemen."

Returning To England. On August 2nd Sergt.-Maj. James, who for five years has been attached to the Royal military college as sergeant-major and physical instructor, will sail from Montreal for England, where he joins the gymnastic staff at Aldershot. During his residence here Sergt.-Maj. James has made a host of friends who will all be pleased to hear of his success. He has been painstaking in his labors and has given unqualified satisfaction to those under whom he served. His successor is Sergt. Prince, a second class staff sergeant of gymnastic staff. He is a graduate of the Gosport garrison gymnasium, and will report here for duty about the middle of October. Sergt.-Maj. James has an offer to go to Australia for a term of years.

Owner Of Bonaventure. Last season the point known as Bonaventure, Alexandria Bay, long occupied by the late J. G. Holland, was purchased by G. T. Rafferty and George C. Boldt. Mr. Rafferty is now sole owner of the Holland property, which is in the village of Alexandria Bay, from several hundred yards on the Lower bay and as much from the shore as the main channel. It contains about thirty acres, a beautiful cottage, keeper's lodge, and six tenants' cottages. The consideration was understood to be \$50,000 when the sale was made last summer, but the price paid Mr. Boldt for his interest is not known.

Repairing The Fair Grounds. Caretaker Conley, with two teams and four men, started to work yesterday to repair the damage done to the fair grounds by the circus on Saturday last. Considerable fence has to be rebuilt, and the ground and race track levelled up. A portion of the big entrance gate was torn down, and it will have to be replaced.

THE HOWE ISLAND PICNIC WAS LARGELY ATTENDED ON WEDNESDAY.

The cattle were distributed by the parishioners, and the proceeds were for church purposes. This sum, together with that realized by the raffle of two cows, brought the total proceeds from the sale of cattle up to about \$1,000. Miss Alice Kennedy, who resides with Mrs. Swift, King street, held the lucky ticket that won one of the animals. A Gannaque orchestra supplied music for dancing, which was indulged in both afternoon and evening. A splendid dinner was served by the island ladies, who showed themselves to be skillful in this respect. At 8 p.m. Gannaque people left for home. Kingstonians expected to leave at the same hour, but it was ten o'clock before their boat arrived and eleven o'clock before they reached the shore. The picnic was a most successful enjoyable one in every respect.
