FAMOUS PREDICTION NEVER OCCURRED.

What Madame Really Did Say-The King's Predisposition to Illness-His Recovery Was Predicted, But Care Was En-

Paris, June 25 When the king's iliness became known here, two days ago, a rumour was circulated that Mme de Thebes, a fortune-teller, who many years ago appeared here under the auspices of the younger Dumas. had predicted eight or ten years ago that the then prince of Wales would never be crowned. As this story has make this prophetic fiction a genuine tradition, I called on Mme. de Thebes. to ascertain whether she had uttered the expressions attributed. My visit had stiff another excuse. the prediction of a melancholy future for her. I have answered them, It is false. The king's illness, which declared itself forty-eight hours ago is for me a proof that England's destiny is not so gloomy as you say, for if that malady had broken out six or eight weeks ago, instead of two days, there is no telling what great, perhaps disastrous, influence it would have exercised on the South African question. The English would, perhaps, have undergone a depression which would have been patent to the whole world. and would have changed the attitude both of the English and the Boers, whereas peace is now concluded; and if the king unfortunately disappeared, apart from the immense grief which the English would experience, nothing would be changed in their internal strength and in their policy. There would be a king less and a king more, and the nation, in spite of its grief, having, perhaps, a voice less emphatic and commanding abroad, would nevertheless without faltering or bestitation continue its course. I hope for the king's recovery, and if this be realized, even if his reign is of limited duration, that limit be sufficient for him to show the real qualities which will rank him among grand figures of the
