MINERS WILL WIN.

Washington, D.C., July 10.—President Gompers, of the American federation of labor, who is here, in an interview, last night, said: "The convention of the united mine workers which meets in Indianapolis, will vote on the proposition of calling all the soft coal miners of the United States out on a general strike. I hardly believe they will do this because it would be better to keep them at work and concentrate all our strength on the anthracite strike. The miners will win. We are with them heart and soul."

To Leave Tien-Tsin.

Washington, D.C., July 10.—Secretary Hay's prompt action upon the appeal of the Chinese government, through Yuan Shi Kai and minister Wu relative to the evacuation of Tien Tsin, has met with success.

Crops In Lennox.

Napanee, July 9.—The crops in this section are better than they have been for years. The heavy rains have not done any damage as yet, as hay and grain of all kinds have been slower coming on, owing to the late spring.

To Continue The Strike.

Chicago, July 10.—A large percentage of the freight handlers, at a meeting this morning, voted to continue the strike.

Bright Weather Welcomed.

Farmers in the city-to-day stated that the hay on the lowlands was in a bad condition. In some cases it stood in a inch of water, and, where cut, had turned black. A few days like Thursday would be gladly welcomed by the farmers, who are afraid they may yet lose their hay crop.

Handsome Lady Affected.

At noon, a handsome and refined looking lady came to the city, from a river resort, under the influence of liquor or narcotic. She was found asleep in the toilet room of an hotel, and taken care of by the proprietor's wife.

HENLEY REGATTA.

How The Finals Came Out On The River.

Henley, July 10.—The day for the finals in the regatta dawned with a heavy downpour of rain. The diamond sculls was won by E. S. Kelly, of Balliol college, Oxford. He defeated R. B. Esherington-Smith, of the Leader rowing club, in the final heat for the trophy.

Toronto Crew Admired.

London, July 10.—The London newspapers to-day express their elation that the final heats at Henley will be fought out solely between British competitors, but they sympathize with and admire the sportsmanlike qualities of the crew of the Argonaut rowing club, Toronto, and of C. S. Titus, of the Union boat club, New York.

The Chronicle regards the defeat of Titus as so unexpected that there must be some such reason as ill-health to explain it. The Daily Telegraph says the Canadians covered themselves with glory even in defeat, and regards F. S. Kelley, of Oxford, as the best sculler ever seen at Henley. This paper says that Titus was too easily beaten for his defeat to be explained by anything but want of pace.

LOSSES BY THE FIRE.

Several Concerns Badly Affected By The Blast.

Toronto, July 10.—No definite statement is yet available as to the losses by to-day's fire. The destroyed warehouse was one of the largest storage places in Toronto. The buildings were owned by the Toronto railway company, leased to McIntosh & Co.

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THE NEWS OF THE WORLD.

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF THE EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody.—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read And Remembered by the Dear Public.

It has finally been decided to lay a cable from Antioch to the Macleod Islands. The distance is 116 miles.

A divorce bill is said to be in full operation in Jamestown, N.Y., and efforts will be made to close it up.

President Eliot, of Harvard university, will probably be made president of the National educational association.

Harry Leslie Blundell McClamont, M.P., has been chosen to succeed the earl of Hopetoun as governor-general of the commonwealth of Australia.

As the result of a head-on collision between two cars at Caldwell, N.Y., Mrs. Charles Stockwell, Stillwater, was killed, and sixteen others injured.

Louis Coste, formerly chief engineer of the department of public works, will be appointed to succeed Mr. Gobeil as deputy minister of public works.

Lady Henry Somerset, president of the world's W.C.T.U., after attending the convention in Portland, Me., in October, will subsequently visit Montreal, Toronto and Chicago.

At the moulders' convention in Toronto a vote of \$10,000 was passed for the striking coal miners, to be paid if president Mitchell decides to call for help from other labor bodies.

Della Roberts, a pretty eighteen-year-old girl, of New York, drank carbolic acid while in a crowd on the street, and then handed the bottle to a policeman. She has a chance of recovery.

At Onondaga Indian reserve, on Wednesday, during a storm, chief Levi Jonathan, driving a team of horses, attached to a buggy, near their council house, was killed outright, as also was one horse.

The majority of "one" is still the piece of resistance of the tory papers. When shortly the Renewal election will make it two and other circumstances make it something more, it is hard to foresee what they will do.

Bertha Smith, a young Rochester, N.Y., girl, suffered robbery and criminal assault at the hands of nine ruffians on the night of July 3rd. The gang is now under arrest, and there are other serious charges against them.

A decree abolishing the post of government commissioner of Lake Chad, thus making that territory a province of the French Congo colonies, indicates the intention of the new ministry to limit the independence of the French officials in the region in question.

Frontenac Cheese Board.

Kingston, July 10.—At to-day's session of the Frontenac cheese board these buyers were in attendance: L. W. Murphy, O. C. Bissell, D. J. McKinnon, R. Thompson, F. E. Vanliven and A. Alexander. There was a large sprinkling of salesmen. There were boarded, 1,686 boxes, of which 380 were white and 1,306 colored.

To Begin Work On Church.

The work of decorating and improving St. Stephen's Methodist church will be begun next week. The following were the lowest tenders: Carpentering work, John Jenkin, this city; painting, T. W. Milo, this city; mason work, Douglas & McQuishan, this city; gas fixtures, Earl Co., Toronto; church decorations, G. B. Vanderlee, Toronto. William Newlands is the architect. New electrical and combination fixtures will be placed in the church, and the church, both interior and exterior, will be painted and decorated. The improvements will be on a fine scale, and will cost about \$6,000. It is expected that the work will be completed by the last week in September, when Rev. Dr. Potts, Toronto, will open the church with special services.

Capt. Thomas Crawford Dead.

A message received from Chicago announced the death on Wednesday afternoon, of Capt. Thomas Crawford, of Wolfe Island. Deceased had been lately master of a tug at Chicago. For many years he sailed in these waters, his last command here being the schooner Grantham. Capt. Crawford was widely known and highly respected. He is survived by a wife and three children, living on the island.

Struck The Purser.

Joseph Denny, purser of the steam yacht "City" was fined \$10 and costs at Clayton by justice of the peace Campbell for assaulting purser Vanderwalker of the Thousand Island steamboat company's steamer Islander. Denny refused to pay his fare, and struck the purser in the face.

A tourist named Hillier, a guest at Hotel Randolph, was taken very ill last night. Two physicians and a trained nurse were summoned. The patient was somewhat better this afternoon.
