> Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian rime minister, in responding to the toast, said that no reform had been so prolific as that which gave colonies the right of self-government. Mr. Barton, prime minister of Australian commonwealth, made speech, in which he again rejected the idea of a British zolleverein. He said that Australia could not afford forego her customs collections. was quite ready to defend her shores and contribute to the naval defence of the southern colonies. She did not ask for representation in the imperial parliament.

> There is reason to believe that when the conference of colonial premiers is resumed, probably two weeks hence, the questions of all-British government cable communication between the various parts of the empire will

be discussed and settled. The Pacific cable joining Canada and Australasia is approaching completion, and the project favored is to lay more cables so as to give the government direct independent communication to the Mediterranean stations, India and China, at an estimated cost of \$20,000,000. This will include the compulsory sale at a price to be fixed by arbitration of the lines of the Eastern extension telegraph company from South Africa to Australia. The present indications that the imperial government and the colonies will reach an agreement in this matter both in principle and in the main details, despite the desperate efforts of the Eastern company to

prevent it.

What Is Being Said. A good many tongues have been set loose by the events of the last twenty four hours, but the political situation is not yet clear.
