at Toronto. Toronto, Ont., July 17.-The cabine having declined to interfere, Fred Lee Rice, one of the most desperate criminals with which the Canadian authorities have had to deal in many years, will pay the penalty of his mis-

deeds on the gallows to-morrow. The

Rice was reared on a farm in vicinity of Champaign and when arts of the university of Illinois in 1888 he was a quiet, retired, country boy, whose refined manners and hand some face made him popular among the co-eds. Like many country boys, treedom from parental restraint, which he enjoyed at the university for the first time, had a serious effect on his morals, and in his second year he was known as one of the wildest men in the university. H's evident largeheartedness and kindly disposition made him friends among both faculty and students and it was a long time before formal notice was taken of his actions by the board of administration. > necessary to expell him: Soon after he left the university became associated with the gang of which he is now the only survivor. He was the cleverest of the lot and in most cases the leader in criminal exploits. He was called the forger the scholar, the "poet" of the nefar ious aggregation. with it. Constable Stewart, by this time, had gained the rear end of car, and he shot Jones through arm. Other officers arrived on scene and the three men were recaptured. Jones was taken to a hospital and his arm amputated. He died fromshock and loss of blood and without an expressed regret for his career. Rice and Rutledge were returned iail, and shortly afterward, while exercising in the gallery, Rutledge took the leap over the railing which ended his life almost instantaneously. Rice was then tried for his part in the kill ing of constable Boyd. His family and friends came to his rescue with funds for his defence, but despite all efforts on the part of his counsel was found guilty after a short trial and given the extreme penalty. Every

YOUNG ELOPERS CAUGHT. Skipped From Syracuse—Charged

With Theft of Money. Wednesday afternoon chief of police Baillie received a postal card from the chief of police of Syracuse, N.Y., asking him to keep a lookout for Miss Anna O'Leary, the seventeen year-old daughter of Mrs. Catherine O'Leary, of No. 122 McCormick avenue. A reward of \$25 was offered for the apprehension of the girl. Police constable Craig was given charge o the case and about nine o'clock last night arrested the girl and her lover at Bibby's livery after they had returned from a drive. They had been out for an hour or two with a fancy horse and a rubber-tired rig.

A despatch from Syracuse stated that Mrs. O'Leary had sworn out a warrant for the arrest of her daughter, charging her with grand larceny for the alleged theft of \$303, which the mother received Saturday on a life insurance policy held by her husband, whose death occurred two weeks ago. The disappearance of the girl was due to a love affair. Miss O'Leary had been keeping com-

pany with a young man named John Millane, who was placed under arrest here with her. She had a rival for his affections, who called on Miss O'Leary Saturday evening while Mil ane was at her home. The caller was jealous of Miss O'Leary. A spirited war of words ensued between the young women. Miss O'Leary ordered Millane and her rival from the house and emphatically instructed them not to return.

Sunday evening Miss O'Leary left her home, and a short time later Mrs. O'Leary discovered the loss of the \$303, which she had placed in a small desk and carefully locked up, i being too late to deposit it in a bank The whereabouts of the money was known only to herself and her daugh

Miss O'Leary is about seventeen years of age, five feet, four or five tall and weighs 120 or 125 sounds.
