FAMOUS ORANGEMAN DEAD. Visited Kingston Twice - Was

Capt. Gaskin's Guesti William Johnston, M.P., for South Belfast, from 1885 to 1900, who died in Thursday at Ballykilbeg, county Down, Ireland, was one of the world most famous Orangemen. Several times he visited Canada, and was in Kingston in 1866 and 1891.

Capt: Gaskin was a personal friend of the great Irishman. He said: "Mr Johnston was a popular leader, and gave his life for the promotion of the Orange order. In all parts of the world he was revered by the Orange men, because of his faithfulness. H determination to procure for the loy alists of Ireland the right to hold an nual demonstrations endeared him particularly to the northern Irish pro vinces. He persisted in demanding

for all, equal rights. About the year 1866, the captain says, Mr. Johnston spoke on th cricket field of this city, he being then making a tour of Canada, getting in formation about Fenianism.
